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



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PASSENGER AIR SERVICE WILL SOON COME

If the plans of C. C. Palmerston, representing a firm of California designers and builders of airplanes, come to pass, it will not be long before a trip to Honolulu will be a mere matter of two hours or so and the sound of an airplane overhead will arouse no more interest than would a passing "Lifzle." Mr. Palmerston addressed the Honolulu Ad Club one day last week, and the Star-Bulletin gives the following account of his speech:

"When I speak of a passenger service by air between the principal islands of the Hawaiian group, I am speaking of a certainty, not a possibility or a probability. I assure you that within a very short time there will be regular service between the main islands of the group. There will be daily trips to Maui and Hawaii and triweekly service between this island and Kauai. As our business increases, as I am sure it will, we will put on two round trips daily between Oahu and Hawaii, including Maui and a daily service between here and Kauai.

"I have been here in Hawaii for some months looking over the advisability of establishing this service, and I find that conditions are even better than we had expected. I thought I would have to do missionary work here as far as airplanes are concerned, but I find that the majority of the people are already well acquainted with the advantages of the system that we will establish. Passenger service by air, such as we have to offer is just as safe as any other means of transportation, more comfortable and speedier. We can cut the time one-sixth of what it now takes to travel from one island to the other. There is little danger, as our ships can come down and light on the water in case of necessity, but it is not probable that we will have to take advantage of this resource. The hull of our airship is so designed that it is the same as a lifeboat in the water. It is equipped with extra engines in order to propel it thru the water in case anything should happen to the engines.

"The question has been raised as to whether or not this will bring about competition and cut down the amount of business now being done by the steamship company. Absolutely not—experience shows that in every instance the volume of traffic has increased with the means of transportation. All of the other islands will be the same as suburbs of Honolulu when the passenger service by air is established.

Asks Only Good Will.

"All we ask is your good will and support, and we want you to give us a chance to show you what our service will mean to Hawaii and the people of Hawaii."



JAPANESE PRINCES COMING TO HONOLULU

Two Japanese princes of royal connections although not members of the royal family itself will visit Honolulu this month. They are Prince Kachonomiya Hiroto and Prince Kunenomiya Asahiro.

The visitors will arrive on the Japanese naval training ships Izumo and Yugumo, commanded by Capt. Haroku Saito. Nine high officers of the navy and 268 naval cadets are making the cruise.

Both of the royal princes are naval cadets and the present voyage is regarded as an important feature of their training for the future. Numerous social affairs are being planned by representatives in Honolulu of Japanese officialdom and the visit will be made an occasion for the farther strengthening of Japanese-American friendly relations.

The Japanese association of Hilo is planning to request the local Japanese consulate to extend to it the privilege of taking the two Japanese princes to the volcano of Kilauea.

This request will not be granted it is believed, in view of the fact that the consulate has received word from the Japanese foreign office requesting not to give the princes any special treatment but to treat the princes and other cadets alike when they are entertained upon their arrival in Honolulu. The princes are making the cruise not as members of the Japanese imperial but as plain cadets.
