**Y. M. C. A. TRUSTEES HOLD AN IMPORTANT MEETING**

The Kaula county committee of the Young Men's Christian Association met last Saturday evening at the home of the chairman, Dr. A.H. Waterhouse, in Koloa. The business meeting was preceded by a dinner session which was greatly enjoyed by all. Of the 14 members of the committee all were present but one.

**Secretary's Report**

Nell Locke, field secretary, read an interesting report, giving in some detail an account of the work and emphasized the value and importance of the work being done with the various boys' clubs throughout the eighteen of these organized clubs in ten different communities. Seven of these groups are among plantation workers, four composed of young men living in towns, six with grammar school boys, and two of high school fellows.

A few of the weekly reports sent to the county office by the secretary of each club shows the nature and variety of the program:

Hanalei Three-C Club, Dec. 2, talk "First Aid of the injured. Next week a debate.

Huleia, Dec. 14, debate and games. Next meeting bible study and parliamentary drill.

Koloa Hi-Y, Dec. 9. Planned camping trip to Mana. Next meeting, discussion on friendship; camping trip to Barking Sands.

Anahola, Three-C. We played skin the snake, dog fight, and many other games. Next week next lesson in bible study.

Wailua, Dec. 31, business and discussion, adoption of constitution and appointment of committees. Next week, program in charge of physical committee.

Dormitory Hi-Y, talk by Dr. O'Morgan on "Care of the Body."

Kilauea, Three-C, instruction in parliamentary law. Next week, talk by Dr. Patterson.

Two Father and Son banquets with an attendance 155 were held during national Father and Son Week.

Hikes and overnight camps have been participated in by the members of various clubs. The rains spoiled the plans of several vacation hiking parties scheduled by the secretary.

Two leaders' meetings have been conducted in which the leaders of clubs throughout the county have studied and planned together the most efficient methods of conducting club work.

An increased spirit in play and the learning of many new games with the accompanying beneficial effects of wholesome physical exercise are resulting from the mass games and stunts which are a part of each meeting's program.

Mr. Brandt, treasurer, read the financial report showing an overdraft that, brought up to date, would amount to about \$3,400.

To meet, at any rate this debt, it was proposed to dispose of the Y. M. C. A. house and lot at Elele to the McBryde Sugar Co., refunding say, a fourth of the proceeds to the Hawaiian Board in consideration of the \$1000 which they had contributed toward the building of the house.

Mr. Brandt was appointed a committee of one to confer with Mr. Alexander, manager of the plantation, and secure from him his best offer for the property.

**Budget Campaign**

Mr. Sloggett, on behalf of the finance committee, reported on a budget tentatively set at \$5,000 for the needs of the year's work, but recommending that it would be advisable to raise that amount to \$6,000.

He recommended that this amount be raised by means of a budget campaign, of short, intensive character, to be undertaken immediately.

There was a good deal of general discussion as to the details of the plan and the best way to accomplish it. It was finally decided to divide the field and the amount among the various members present and others, and the week beginning Monday, January 9th, was fixed for the beginning of the campaign.

**Thrift Campaign**

A thrift campaign of a purely educational character, mostly confined to boys and young men was approved to be undertaken during the month of January.

**County Y. M. C. A. Convention**

The date for this was set for January 27 at which time the Y.W. C. A. would hold a somewhat similar meeting and it was suggested that the two affairs might be combined with mutual benefit. Prominent features determined on were an evening banquet and a special speaker from Honolulu. Emil Berndt had been tentatively engaged as this speaker.
