HIGH TIME TO ACT.

The work of the Royalist propaganda in this city may be viewed in the Honolulu correspondence of the New York Tribune, the text of which is reprinted to day's STAR.

Who the writer of the Tribune letter is, does not appear; but it is plain, by the way he treats Hawaiian questions, that he is credulous rather than vicious and has permitted himself to be filled up by the Royalist junta with most amazing falsehoods about the present and prospective welfare of the Hawaiian government and people.

Undoubtedly this Tribune letter has done great damage. We hear as much in private correspondence, and see the fact in newspaper comment, even the Tribune itself having been led thereby to fear that the Provisional power is on its last legs.

The way the financial affairs of the kingdom were carried on has an object lesson in the leases of crown lands. Think of letting F. H. Hayselden control 100,000 acres for \$250 per year—a domain which, at a rental of but one cent an acre would now be yielding four times that sum.

In a list of 350 taxpayers given by the STAR, a royalist paper felicitates itself that it had found five mistaken ratings. No complaint on this score has been made by the parties personally concerned and this journal waits their pleasure in the matter.

THE COLBURN LETTER.

The difference between facts as they are and facts as they are described in the royalist prints is pretty well shown by the Thurston letter to Colburn. For weeks the ex-Queen's organs told the public that this letter contained a most damaging admission that, without Colburn's help, the revolutionary cause was doomed.

WASHINGTON, March 16, 1893. J. F. COLBURN, HONOLULU, HAWAII. Friend Colburn: I have just written to Antonio Rosa on the subject of annexation and asked him to show you the letter. Please consider that parts in the letter written as much to you as to him.

Whatever our political differences may have been in the past, I give you credit, as I believe you do me for acting as you thought best in the interest of Hawaii and the Hawaiians. I see by the papers that your name is more or less connected with that of Ashford, Peterson and other political agitators of that stripe.

The sum of the matter is that Mr. Thurston told the ex-Minister of the Interior and present Minister of the Exterior, that his course would "tend to perpetuate race feeling," but that, if changed in favor of annexation, it would, "under the circumstances, have a strong effect."

The discussion of this evil proposition in the Legislature was postponed by the Cabinet complications. It will probably come up at an early date. Meanwhile the delay has given opportunity for a vigorous and united expression of public opinion against the inquiry.

THE LOTTERY PETITIONS.

A Discussion of Mr. Nordhoff's Construction of Them.

EDITOR STAR:—In Mr. Charles Nordhoff's letter to the New York Herald, and the crowd of what he would gently term "misleading" statements, occurs a labored one about the petition to the last legislature in support of the lottery bill.

They are these: Those petitions were signed prior to the first introduction of the Lottery Bill, which was August 30th—four and a half months before its final passage. The signatures were procured by a rapid secret canvassing, before publicity had been given to the movement, and the so-called "missionary" element, whose special function is to be alert on moral issues, could call attention to the evils of the measure.
