THE FARCE OF PROTECTION

A broad smile of amusement went across the face of the town last evening when it was learned that Mr. Nordhoff had applied for protection to the United States Minister, and that, at the request of the latter, the Provisional Government had detailed two native policemen to guard the Herald correspondent's lodgings.

Careful inquiry shows that the only basis for the Herald man's fears—apart from that conscience which, as the poet says, doth make cowards of us all—was a stray remark here and there that he ought to be tarred and feathered. As Mr. Nordhoff is well aware, such talk is often heard in times of political debate, and is but the smallest of small change in the circulation of public opinion.

Why, then, did he ask protection? Wait and see! If he doesn't use the fact that he got it to fill the columns of the Herald with a lurid tale of how he escaped death at the hands of an infuriated Annexation mob, only to be saved by the intervention of Minister Blount and the reluctant display of Provisional force, then the STAR misses a reasonable guess.

In the meantime it is to be hoped that the two native guardians of Mr. Nordhoff's person and peace will manage to keep awake during the drowsy days and soporific nights which envelop the pastoral region of Nuanu street.

THE NEW MINISTER.

The new United States Minister, Hon. James H. Blount, formally assumed his new duties to-day.

Unlike most other newcomers in the Hawaiian diplomatic field, Colonel Blount has the advantage of a wide acquaintance here at the beginning of his ministry. He knows our people and our people know him, and so both are spared the need of speculation and conjecture as to each other's character and purposes.

It is a pleasure to welcome a man like Colonel Blount to the diplomatic corps, for he is one in whose personality the American population of Hawaii nei take becoming pride. Back of Minister Stevens' time there have been occasions when our people of American birth or descent had no reason to feel proud of the ministerial choice of the United States Government; but that would never have been the case if every incumbent of the Honolulu post had been so deserving, or half so deserving, as the present one, who, as a gentleman, a scholar and a statesman, illuminates and dignifies the American name.

The esteemed Bulletin thinks that inconsistency, like a worm in the bud, feeds on the damask cheek of the STAR, because we say in one place that the planters did not begin the revolution and prove in another that they are now, as a rule, in favor of Annexation. Just where the inconsistency comes in it would be difficult for any one but the Bulletin, whose eyes have grown microscopic in their search for a lost business, to determine. Is it inconsistency to say that a man is a Republican now when it is known that he was called a Democrat three months ago, and, in the meantime, has changed his views? Everybody here knows that the chief objections to the movement of January 17th were raised by the sugar planters; and everybody also knows that since that time the sugar men have come to believe that their interests lie in the direction of stable government. To print out these facts involves about as much inconsistency as it would to remark that a man couldn't eat caviare three months ago, but has now grown to be fond of it.

PROFESSOR ALEXANDER, an entirely competent authority, states that the Puukapu district, where certain crown land subdivisions have been made, is composed of good soil, which, with or without irrigation, can be made to produce an abundance of coffee. The land has been overrun with cattle, and is not a feast for the eye, but its fertility can't be questioned. The mere matter of brush counts for nothing against the quality of the Puukapu soil, as it is a maxim among agriculturists that land which grows wild shrubs, plants or trees, can be made to yield crops. This agrees entirely with what the STAR has observed, and is not to be lightly disputed even by such experts upon the pursuits of husbandry as the editors of the Royalist papers.

ONE more taxpayer—W. C. Lane—announces that he has not been properly classed in the STAR Annexation list. This makes seven out of 359 names. The list was not regarded as perfect when we printed it and we said as much. It still remains open to correction and we shall welcome authorized data that can assist us in giving it the precision which it should bear in the final summing up. So far the changes asked for have been mostly to the credit side of Annexation.

WHILE the subject of military increase is before the people it might not be inopportune to suggest a volunteer cavalry troop of sixty men. There are probably enough young horsemen here, owning or able to provide their animals, to make the experiment a success. Cavalry, particularly in cities, is one of the most efficient forces known for the dispersal of mobs, and it has an excellent function besides in the matter of patrol duty.

In one letter Mr. Nordhoff declares that, when Minister Stevens recognized the Provisional Government, Mr. Irwin refused, "with contempt," to raise the American flag over his Honolulu office.

In another letter this same Mr. Nordhoff says, on the authority of Claus Sprickels, that Mr. Irwin was at New York at the time,—as indeed he was. Is this another case where "special care" was used?

THE friends of Mr. Stevens will not all be able to turn out to-night—in fact, there is no room at the Eagle and in its neighborhood for a fraction of them—but enough will be there to convince the ex-Minister and his family of the respect and regard in which they are publicly and privately held on the Hawaiian Islands.

BY AUTHORITY.

ACT 85. AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE AN ADDITIONAL SUM OF MONEY FOR INCIDENTALS AND CRIMINAL EXPENSES UNDER THE DEPARTMENT OF THE ATTORNEY-GENERAL.

Be it Enacted by the Executive and Advisory Councils of the Provisional Government of the Hawaiian Islands:

SECTION 1. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars is hereby appropriated from the Public Treasury, in addition to the sum heretofore appropriated, for Incidentals and Civil and Criminal Expenses under the Department of the Attorney-General.

SECTION 2. This Act shall take effect from the date of its publication.

Approved this 18th day of May, A.D. 1893. (Signed) SANFORD B. DOLE, President of the Provisional Government of the Hawaiian Islands. (Signed) J. A. KING, Minister of the Interior.
