As Mr. Bennett had ordered absolute silence kept about the accident, all sorts of alarming rumors were soon afloat. No one is allowed to see either Mr. Bennett or those attending him. Dr. Sedenter says the patient will be able to get away from Paris to a resort for invalids in less than a month if he obeys orders and keeps perfectly quiet.

TROUSSEAU OF A PRINCESS.

How the Bride of the Duke of York Will be Arrayed.

LONDON, June 10.—From some of the manufacturers there has been secured an account of a part of the trousseau of Princess May, placed with nearly all the larger houses in various parts of the country so as to please as wide a section as possible. From the silk works at Spitalfields comes a dinner dress, the color ground of which is fleur de peche. The damask is composed of rosebuds, jasmine and maidenhair, each bouquet connected with a silver metal tie. From Spitalfields come also the materials for an evening costume of pale blue and gold.

The work of the Winchester makers commands admiration for a simple home dinner dress. The color selected is a pale green, ornamented with spots, stripes and daisies. A charming morning robe, composed of thin summer silk, bears testimony to the high standard of the Leeds printed silks. The ground of this dress is myrtle green, while violets adorn the design, which is of perfect workmanship. The going-away dress is to be Irish poplin of a particularly pretty shade of ivory white, with relief of gold.

After the marriage the young couple will ride in state through the city. Arrangements at St. James Palace are finished, and seats for about 160 people altogether have been planned.

A SUCCESSFUL LAUNCH.

The Line-of-Battle Ship Massachusetts Leaves the Ways.

PHILADELPHIA, June 10.—The big battleship Massachusetts was successfully launched from the yards of the Cramps this morning in the presence of the Secretary of the Navy Herbert, Attorney-General Olney—representing the State of Massachusetts, a number of distinguished naval and army officers and a multitude of 15,000.

The big hull received the last touches of a coat of white paint above the water line, and a deep red below, Thursday, and towed on the ways, all ready to be sent overboard as soon as the tide was at its flood. When the hour arrived the supports were cut away, and as the vessel began to move Miss Lella Herbert, daughter of the Secretary of the Navy, broke a bottle of wine on the ship's prow and christened her Massachusetts.

By her own momentum the latest addition to the United States navy slid gracefully down the greased incline and dashed into the Delaware river. When she reached mid-stream lines were thrown to the tugs and the huge craft was soon made fast to the wharves, where were also moored the cruisers New York and Columbia and the ship-of-war Indiana.

The Massachusetts is the second to be launched of the three coast line-of-battleships authorized by the act of Congress of June 30, 1890, the individual cost not exceeding \$4,000,000. Cramp & Sons were awarded two of these at a contract price of \$3,020,000 apiece. The Massachusetts is built of steel. The hull is protected by belts of heavy armor seven and one-half feet wide, three feet of which is above water.

This protection runs along both sides a distance of 128 feet amidships, at the extremities of which the armor turns in toward the center line at an angle of forty-five degrees for a distance of twenty-four feet, affording a total broadside protection of 196 feet and passing around and supporting the armor for the thirteen-inch gun turrets. On the top of this is a steel deck two and three quarters inches thick, under which are the magazines and machinery. Above the belts of armor and extending from redoubt to redoubt, is a side armor five inches thick, with a backing of ten feet of coal.

The vessel is cut up forward beneath the water line, making a powerful ram bow and doing away with the excessive bow waves, on account of the easier lines so obtained, as well as greatly adding to her maneuvering qualities.

Guarding Against Cholera.

LONDON, June 10.—The Local Government Board has cancelled all summer leaves of absence to its medical men and ordered an unceasing watch at all British ports against the entrance of cholera until the end of September.

ALEXANDRIA, June 10.—There were seventy deaths from cholera at Mecca yesterday, against sixty the day before.

PARIS, June 10.—The cholera has appeared at Narbonne, Dr. Meclie of the Narbonne Hospital having died of the disease.


