THE VOICE OF JACOB. Bishop Willis' Royalist views might deserve the respect which the labor of confuting them would bestow, were it not for the lack of disinterestedness behind their utterance. The Bishop is not greatly concerned, as he would make it appear, about "the Queen and the native people," but he is quite aware that the tenure of his Episcopal dignity depends upon the defeat of Annexation. Should union with America come to pass, the Anglican church of Hawaii would disappear and the Episcopal see of the United States would obtain local jurisdiction. It is not to be supposed, under such circumstances, that Mr. Willis could remain in his present office, as the American church would doubtless appoint a missionary bishop who would be agreeable to communicants upon these Islands. Knowing all this, Mr. Willis has become a monomaniac upon the subject of "restoration," but so long as the public is aware that, in speaking one word for the "Queen" he is speaking twenty for himself, it will not go to the trouble of taking up his arguments seriously. The hand may be that of a patriotic Esau, but the voice is that of a self-seeking Jacob.

TOBACCO CULTURE. If Commissioner Marsden's ideas of tobacco culture on these Islands should be carried out, it would be well to import a few expert tobacco growers from abroad to put the industry on a proper basis. There is much more to it than the mere planting, growth and curing of the weed. In fact, a hundred "fancy touches" now enter tobacco-farming problems; such, for example, as the discharge of a small cannon between the rows of plants when the latter have reached a certain stage of growth. The concussion thereby produced kills the larvae of the tobacco insect pest and leaves the crop free from blight at a critical time in its development. There are other processes just as curious, but which are based on good sense and long experience, and are necessary to the commercial success of tobacco plantations. A knowledge of these, such as may be had in Cuba or Sumatra, is a needed preliminary to success in the production of a clean and wholesome leaf. It would be a mistake not to acquaint oneself with the entire method of foreign tobacco culture before entering upon production here with a competitive object.

SOME of the smaller dailies in the United States that feel politically bound to criticize the Hawaiian Government are making a rueful spectacle of themselves. One of these, the Wilmington (Del.) Star, announces that the new press law here—which, by the way, affects Annexationist as well as Royalist prints—is an evidence of a weak governmental hold upon public sentiment. To this sapient remark it adds that the passage of the Arms and Ammunition Act points to a similar sad conclusion. This leaves us at liberty to suppose that the measures taken awhile ago in Chicago to fix the responsibility for the management of anarchist newspapers and that to limit the purchase of dynamite shows that the Illinois government is also on its last legs. And how about the seizure of newspapers, the arrest of editors, and the search for private arms in the North during the Lincoln administration? Will the Star elucidate that? It is a subject much nearer home.

THE San Francisco Post was quick to see the real significance of Minister Thurston's reception by the President. "It fits like a new coat on the back of the Provisional Government," said that intelligent journal, "practically habituating it with the sanction of the United States in its revolution against the Queen." Such is the conclusion of the whole matter from any reasonable point of view, and it justifies the statement of President Dole that restoration at the hands of the United States is now "diplomatically impossible." If the Royalists know what is for their best interests they will stop their rain-bow-chasing and go in for such practical advantages as they may be able to gain from the American citizenship which

must be the ultimate result of pending negotiations. It is much to be regretted that any one should have posted a threatening notice upon Mr. Spreckels' gate. The act was either that of an irresponsible youth, a practical joker whose ideas of humor are crude, or of a common blackguard. In either event the annoyance to Mr. Spreckels was the same. The STAR begs to assure the Sugar King that its objections to him as a politician, which are more than ever pronounced, do not preclude it from the hope that the person who put up the offensive placard may be caught and made an example of. Every law-abiding community needs to make common cause against the forms of ruffianism which so much as hint at private vengeance as a remedy for public ills.

"RESTORATION day" is becoming a standing joke. It has been fixed at least twenty times since Mr. Blount arrived, notably on the 15th of April, the 10th and 24th of May, the 13th of June, and the 25th of this month—the latter date having just been cancelled for a little more margin. Instead of the old refrain "Every day'll be Sunday by and by," we shall have a daily Restoration day, followed by the usual postponement on account of the weather and the sickness of the trick mule. Really, the sanguine Royalists should take a Restoration day off now and then and go fishing. It would do them good.

It was quite like Charles Nordhoff to announce, before he left Honolulu, that he had killed annexation. One of the early Popes had a similar impression about the comet against which he had directed a tremendous bull; and the world has been using the bones of that ecclesiast ever since to whet the edge of culling paragraphs. As to the comet, science says it ran along in its great orbit with supreme indifference to all the bulls that ever grazed on the seven hills of Rome. It is the same way with annexation in respect to the bullying of the Herald pensioner.

A ROYALIST newspaper denies that the ex-Chamberlain is a "discharged official" of the Government. The ex-Chamberlain himself, who found his name erased from the public salary list one fine morning, has quite a different opinion. If he has not been discharged he must wonder, in his bewildered way, what the expunging process is called. In his case the present sovereign authority of Hawaii swung a remarkably sharp ax—more power to it!

JUDGE COOLEY DEFENDED. One of His Former Students Asks a Modified Judgment of Him.

EDITOR STAR.—If you will permit me space I should be glad to avail myself of this opportunity to say a good word on behalf of Judge Cooley. This gentleman was one of my instructors in the law school of the University of Michigan, and has, ever since my first acquaintance with him at that time, been a warm personal friend and a kind counsellor. I know him so intimately, and have such high regard for his great qualities, that I exceedingly regret the disposition, not only in your paper, but in another Honolulu daily, to censure that gentleman somewhat too severely for his opposition to annexation. I have not read the article in the Forum, but I learned while in Washington from another friend that Judge Cooley had taken that view of the question and was disposed to give his ideas publicity. I ask you and other friends of annexation for a more kindly judgment upon an aged man, broken in health and saddened by bereavement, who from those reasons possibly exhibits heat and nervousness, and displays less of the force and perception than his friends have become accustomed to expect from him. Let me bespeak for this distinguished gentleman credit for sincerity in his legal and constitutional objections to annexation, and charity for those points of difference in which he errs for want of more accurate information.
