

FROM THE COLONIES.

Latest News Received by the Mail.

The steamship Mariposa arrived at 4 P. M. yesterday from the Colonies with two days' later news, of which the following is the most important:

SYDNEY, June 15.—The greatest flood on record occurred yesterday at Kempsey, on the Macleay river. Central Kempsey was entirely under water, and a large number of houses were completely swept away, while many others collapsed. The town and surrounding district present a terrible scene of devastation. Many of the inmates of the wrecked buildings had narrow escapes from drowning, and their cries of distress continued throughout the night. One boat capsized and the occupants were thrown into the water, but were eventually rescued. Great quantities of stock have been drowned, but no loss of human life is reported. A number of houses in West Kempsey were also swept away.

Orders have been granted by the court in London for the compulsory winding up of the following suspended banks: Commercial Banking Company in Sydney, Standard of Australia, National of Australasia, Australian Joint Stock, and City of Melbourne. In each case the official receiver was instructed to take no steps without the sanction of the court.

BERLIN, June 16.—At the elections to-day Herr Liebknecht, the well-known Socialist leader, was elected for Berlin by immense majorities. A second ballot, however, is necessary in other four districts. Though the Socialists polled twenty thousand in Berlin and ninety thousand in the other electorates, not 10 per cent. of the votes were recorded for supporters of the Army Bill. Three Socialists were elected for Hamburg. The party also secured five seats in the provinces, and has the best prospects in many other electorates. In a large number of instances second ballots will have to be taken. There was no disorder during the day.

WASHINGTON, June 15.—Dr. Walker, of St. Paul, Minnesota, while out shooting, fired at a squirrel, and, missing it, shot dead an Indian girl who was standing near. The tribe captured Walker and roasted him on a slow fire, while the relatives of the girl mutilated his body in a fearful manner. The military have gone in pursuit of the Indians.

LONDON, June 15.—Great preparations are being made in Egypt and Hamburg to prevent cholera spreading should there be an outbreak.

LONDON, June 16.—The daily death rate at Mecca from cholera has reached 50.

LONDON, June 16.—The safety of one of Great Britain's battleships, the Hood, of 14 guns, has been imperilled through the scamped riveting of the keel plates. The vessel is leaking badly.

BRISBANE, June 16.—At a general meeting of shareholders in the Royal bank, the reconstruction scheme was adopted.

BRISBANE, June 15.—The total output in the sugar districts is estimated to reach 23,000 tons.

PARIS, June 15.—The Appeal Court has annulled the verdict against the men convicted of corruption in connection with the Panama Canal Company, on the ground of lapse of time, and all the prisoners have been released.

PARIS, June 16.—The Court of Cassation has annulled the judgment on Charles de Lesseps, Fontaine and Eiffel for fraudulent practices. The former has been released, but the two latter will have to complete their sentences for corruption. It is expected that Charles and Ferdinand de Lesseps and Cottu will shortly be pardoned.

WASHINGTON, June 16.—An American warship will probably be sent to Samoa.

HALIFAX, June 14.—The Canadian authorities have seized an American schooner for fishing in prohibited waters.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 14.—The Russian Government has decided to grant an indemnity to the British sealers who were seized in the Behring Sea inside the three-mile limit.

SYDNEY, June 15.—The Admiralty is not prepared to subsidize Mr. Huddart's Sydney-Vancouver line of steamers as naval cruisers until the service has proved to be permanent, when the question of granting a subsidy will be considered.

LONDON, June 15.—London merchants are preparing to consign goods by Huddart, Parker's steamers, via Vancouver. As compared with the route around Cape Horn, it is reckoned there will be a saving of four months in the round trip.

LONDON, June 15.—Sir Saul Samuel, Sir J. F. Garrick, and Sir Charles Tupper are conferring with Earl Spencer, First Lord of the Admiralty, with a view to securing a subvention for Huddart, Parker's line of steamers in the Vancouver-Australian Trade.

LONDON, June 14.—In committee in the House of Commons on the fourth clause of the home rule bill to-day, Mr. G. C. Bartley, member for Islington, moved an amendment which was negative empowering the Irish legislature to establish and endow religion. On the same clause Mr. Gerald Balfour, member for Leeds, moved an amendment which was lost to prevent the Irish legislature from reducing crown salaries and denying pensions.

LONDON, June 15.—The Times says that Mr. Gladstone, having to conclude a fresh bargain with the Irish party, proposes to press the financial clauses of the home rule bill, and then enforce the closure for the remainder of the measure.
