

TELEGRAPHIC NOTES.

Rev. Mr. Briggs continues to preach. Costa Rica is on the verge of revolution. An epidemic of typhoid fever prevails in Oakland. The Monterey has arrived in Seattle in good condition. Dr. McGlynn has returned to New York from Rome. The Government building at Chicago is declared unsafe. An American silver dollar is now worth 57 cents as bullion. Evans and Sontag have been taken to Fresno jail for safe keeping. Mrs. Stanford has been made sole executrix of her husband's will. The fires in the Wisconsin woods have been quenched by the rain. An anti-trust law has received the signature of the Governor of Illinois. The present depressed condition of trade is closing many Eastern cotton mills. Ex-Secretary Foster's account in the Fostoria Bank was overdrawn \$136,000. It is likely that the German Government will have a small majority on the Army Bill. Rear Admiral Markham and the officers of the Camperdown will be court-martialed. The President has left Washington for Buzzard's Bay, Mass., to be absent three or four weeks. Nearly 1,000,000 Columbian souvenir half dollars are still held at the mint in Philadelphia. Tariff reform and the repeal of the Silver bill will be exclusively before the extra session of Congress. Governor Angell of Illinois has pardoned the three Chicago Anarchists who were sent to prison for life. Pierola has landed at Chala, Peru, and gone on to Arequipa. Hostile operations are expected to begin soon. Advices from Folsom say that George Sontag's condition is somewhat improved, but that Schell cannot live. Gladstone will move the adoption of a resolution calling upon the house to expedite the passage of the Home Rule bill. A serious Mongolian rising has occurred at Wehol. The Chinese Government has sent troops to quell the disturbance. Sailing orders have been sent to the United States steamer Concord at Norfolk, Va., and she will sail for the China station. John Berry, the cowboy who arrived first in Chicago, has been awarded the first prize of \$1,000, the protests not held well taken. It is Henry Villard's intention to withdraw from all companies with which he has been identified and retire from active business life. There is a strong probability that the big smelting and refining works at Omaha will be closed on account of the decline of silver. British cruisers Edgar and Phaeton of the Mediterranean squadron, have arrived at Malta with the survivors of the battle-ship Victoria. The leading newspapers of the South show that public sentiment in that section is now overwhelmingly in favor of the repeal of the Sherman law. On June 30th money on call in New York City was held at 35 per cent. In Chicago speculators had to pay 60 per cent for money to carry wheat. The annual boat race between the Harvard and Yale crews was won at New London, Conn., by Yale by four lengths. Distance four miles; time, 25:01 1/2. The Missouri valley smelters are going out of business, and for lack of their product the United States will be unable to carry out the provisions of the Sherman Act. The rumor was current in the treasury that Mexico contemplates stopping the free coinage of silver. Minister Romero, when advised of the rumor, placed no credence in it. A dispatch from Bangkok, the capital of Siam, says that the French gunboat Lutin, is anchored in the river opposite the center of the city and has made preparations to begin a bombardment. A statue of Queen Victoria, the work of the Princess Beatrice, her majesty's youngest daughter, was unveiled in Kensington gardens by the Queen in person in the presence of a large concourse. Captain Berke, senior officer among the survivors of the warship Victoria, will be tried by a special naval board sitting at Malta, for having lost the vessel. Further proceedings depend upon the outcome of this trial. The Bonanza and Golden Eagle mine in the Marqua Hala district, Arizona, has been sold to an English syndicate for \$2,000,000. Hubbard and Bowers of San Francisco bought the property two years ago for \$200,000. The treasury department has declined to give a permit in advance for the landing of 2,300 Jews from abroad, at the request of S. K. Klein, who represents a syndicate engaged in the colonization of 200,000 acres of land in Utah. E. H. Holden, one of the mining kings of Colorado, says that 150,000 men will be out of employment there owing to the silver collapse, that the people will repudiate their Eastern debts, and that the establishment of a Western Empire will follow.
