

PULLING A TIGER'S TOOTH.

Professor Fritz Mauss gently wiped the blood from a pair of gasfitter's pliers yesterday afternoon, says the Chicago Times.

"It is harder to pull a tiger's tooth than an Alderman's leg," he remarked, under the impression that he was quoting from the proverbs of Solomon. The professor was in a profuse perspiration. His shirt sleeves were rolled up. A few yards away in her cage at the Hagenbach menagerie Kitty was panting and swearing. Her whole six or eight feet of brown and black stripes quivered with rage. Kitty is one of the largest tigresses in the mammoth menagerie, and she had just submitted most unwillingly to an operation that cost her a tooth.

For three weeks past Kitty has been the victim of a remorseless toothache—a regular old-fashioned, double-actin anguish that tied knots in her tail and kept her awake nights. Kitty's howls kept the whole menagerie awake. She used to tramp up and down her cage and knock her head against the wall to see if that would produce any good results. The entire population was in despair.

Life was not worth living at the Hagenbach hostelry. There were ponies, high-bred animals with valets to put their manes in paper and sand-paper their backs into glossiness, who had not had as much sleep in a week as a Brighton Park policeman secures in one hour of duty. Something had to be done about it. Poulitices were tried, and Kitty swallowed a half dozen the first night. That gave her indignation, and she was more demonstrative than ever. They tried opiates. Professor Mauss determined upon a radical reform yesterday.

Kitty, after a night-long din, was resting peacefully. To her entered the professor. Likewise the professor's two assistants and a rope. Kitty merely blinked and smacked her lips at the possibility of masticating another poultice. A moment and a stalwart 180-pound man was sitting on her head and each of her four paws were grasped in a noose.

Kitty struggled and howled and frothed at the mouth, but it was all in vain. There was a dexterous twirl of the Professor's pliers, a sharp twinge in her lower jaw, and peace had been won for the wild beast show.

How to Prolong Life.

A scientific writer says that anatomical experiment and investigation show that the chief characteristic of old age are deposits of earthy matter of a gelatinous and fibrous character in the human system. Carbonate and phosphate of lime mixed with other salts of a calcareous nature have been found to furnish the greater part of these earthy deposits. As observation shows, man begins in a gelatinous condition. He ends in an osseous or bony one, soft in infancy, hard in old age. By gradual change in the long space of years the ossification comes on, but after passing middle life a more marked development of the ossific character takes place. Of course these earthy deposits which affect all the physical organs naturally interfere with their functions. Partial ossification of the heart produces the imperfect circulation of the blood which affects the aged. When the arteries are clogged with calcareous matter, there is interference with the circulation, upon which nutrition depends. Without nutrition there is no repair of the body. Hence in his "The Physiology of Common Life," G. H. Lewes states that "if the repair were always identical with the waste life would only then be terminated by accident, never by old age." Both Bichat and Baillie considered that the greater number of people past sixty suffer more or less from arterial ossification, which brings about obstructions in the proper and healthy circulation of the blood.

Akka Pigmies.

Dr. Stuhlmann has brought home two Akka pigmies. He rescued them from the man-eating tribes of the Manjema. These little fellows undoubtedly belong to the most interesting pigmy tribe in Central Africa. The head is unusually large and sits on a slender, thin neck. The upper body is long, the shoulders strikingly broad, with long, thin arms dangling from them. All the joints are large and clumsy except the hands, which betray great refinement of contour and delicacy. Not much is known of their language.

The two pigmies are aged seventeen and fifteen years old, respectively; both are females. For their tour around the world they have been dressed in childish fashion, with short frocks. Their behavior before an audience is extremely childish. They either hide their faces behind their hands, turn their backs on the spectators or laugh and giggle immoderately. All their motions are apish.

At present the German anthropologists are attempting to decide whether the reduced size of their bodies is due to physical degeneration or whether accommodating themselves to the territorial conditions of their native land has brought about a gradual reconstruction of their forms.


