A BASAL DIFFERENCE.

A Royalist newspaper thinks that the STAR has been inconsistent in saying that the native monarchists would get the suffrage by annexation and yet that it would not be politic to let them and their British allies hold a plebiscite to choose between the present Government and the heathen Queen.

We had supposed that the STAR had made its views so plain on these points that the wayfaring man, though a Holomua editor, could not err therein. The question of whether the Hawaiians would be permitted to vote under the American flag is not a local one, but has been fairly well settled by the United States Constitution and by the policy which conferred the ballot upon the Creoles of Louisiana, the Mexicans of California and the negroes of the South, and which conferred upon the tribes of the Indian territory the right of home rule. At the very least these Hawaiians would have the same electoral privilege as their white neighbors.

There need be no alarm over the measles in town. The evil is generally light in such latitudes as these providing that reasonable care is taken of the sick. There should be no fear of an epidemic. The Provisional Government "will be edified" to hear the Advertiser express a charitable hope that it is "not over obtuse." Perhaps hereafter it will try to deserve a better opinion. It should try.
