

DANGER LURKS IN IMPURE WATER.

All Disease Germs Are Killed by Heating to 212 Degrees.

BUFFALO, Aug. 21.—"I do not believe," said an eminent physician to me today "that we are likely to have a visitation from King Cholera this year, although he is already knocking at the gates of New York harbor, but it behooves every one to exercise all possible precautions, so that if the scourge does come the expense will be in good condition. One of the most important things to be guarded against is bad drinking water."

"In the cities this must be done by the authorities. All the drinking water can do in case there is suspicion of impurity in the city supply is to filter, or, better, boil all the water he drinks. Of course I take it for granted that to one of good sense living in town will drink well water in cities—sewage is sure to leak and find its way to the wells, and oftentimes the clearest and most sparkling water is the most dangerous."

"In the country, of course, well water must generally be depended upon, but it should be tested if there is the slightest cause to fear it. This should always be done if the farmer will be exacting on his own ground than the farmyard, and I am not sure that it would be putting it too strongly to say that in such a case it would likely be economy to fill up the well and dig a new one. It is well understood by doctors that fevers, especially typhoid, almost always come from bad drinking water."

"Of course in case of cholera invading a neighborhood there would be great danger of contamination of the water supply. Against tainted water there is one sure safeguard, and that is boiling, for all disease germs are killed by a temperature of 212 degrees, the boiling point."


