THE DEMAND FOR PROTECTION.

If the ex-Queen has asked the United States to restore her to the throne and to protect her there with American bayonets, on the ground that she could not protect herself, what becomes of the plea that her late Government was so strong that, but for Minister Stevens, it could have put down the rebellion single-handed? Surely, under restoration, she would be as well supplied with men and strategic points and better supplied with arms and munitions than she was on the first day of the last new year. And yet we are told, what we have seen in Royalist prints for months past, that she must have American aid to maintain her authority or suffer the threat of its further and final downfall.

This appeal of the ex-Queen, which seems certainly to have been made, must serve, if President Cleveland ever had such an irrational plan as that of putting the Monarchy in power again, to cause him serious reflections. Some of his advisers of the press have told him that the cost of taking care of Hawaii under annexation would be greater than the value received. But how about holding the decayed Hawaiian dynasty together? So long as an American colony is here the House of Kalakaua would have to be surrounded by a garrison as large as that which would be needed under annexation. Then, as to the civil government, to keep that "protected" function from being a pair of thieves, Uncle Sam would be forced to exercise a careful and expensive oversight.

Between a protectorate such as Mrs. Dominis and her friends want and the actual control of the Islands there would be no great difference as to trouble and cost—and what there might be would favor annexation. And then what a spectacle to be set before the eyes and nostrils of the world! On one side an outraged American colony, with a supporting body of high-minded Britons and Germans, representing seven-eighths of the wealth of the Islands, and nearly all of their moral strength! On the other hand, a corrupt Polynesian royalty, flush with human vermin, guarded in its noisome lair by the bayonets of the great republic and defended from American bullets by the stars and stripes! It might be said of Columbia then as it was long ago said of one of her unworthy sons: "There stands the One who has made tyranny secure and of whose health thieves asked before they began to steal."

THE DEMAND FOR PROTECTION.

KING LOBENGULA'S WAR.

GRAND REVIEW AT THE GREAT MILITARY KRAAL.

The slight difference between Victoria and Lobengula, which resulted in the latest war, has made the South African chief of the Matabele conspicuous.

King Lobengula's private residence, which comprises a number of buildings, several of them built in European fashion, are inclosed, together with his private cattle kraal, in a strong stockade of about two miles, leaving an open space of great extent between Lobengula's encampment and the native huts. There are several thousand of these closely packed together. On arriving near the King's entrance we found the King, as usual, in close consultation over a dead ox, with two of his medicine doctors and a rainmaker. The different regiments formed an immense circle, eight to ten feet deep, about 400 in all. They were dressed in their war dress of black ostrich feathers, and profusion of these hanging over their shoulders. Wildcats' and tigers' tails reaching to the ground clothed their loins, and they had on other skin ornaments. Of course all carried shields, assegais and knobkerries. They were divided into regiments, each sixty strong, the whole forming a very picturesque and novel sight.

For some time the men remained mute, not a sound being heard, but occasionally they would burst forth with a war song in their deep bass voices, keeping time by stamping on the ground with their feet, and striking their shields with their assegais. The effect was imposing. Occasionally one or two would come out into the center and go through the performance of fighting the enemy, now advancing, now retreating, now in close combat, making as many stabs as if they were killing a foe. Others then came out and went through the same performance, jumping high into the air and striking their shields with both ends of their short stabbing assegais, all this in the air before touching the ground, the springer knocking his knees and feet together. 
