THE CONSTITUTION ON ACTS OF WAR.

A part of our reasons for believing that the President intends to authorize no hostile or forcible course unless Congress shall enact a law on the subject, is that the United States Constitution is a very essential part of the navy regulations and it provides as follows for carrying on war:

Section eight of Article one of the Constitution expressly gives Congress the power "to declare war," and by Article ten "the powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively or to the people."

The United States Supreme Court has held that "whenever war was to be initiated by an act of the national will, that will could be constitutionally expressed only by an act of Congress."

Apart from the constitutional power of Congress to declare war, as a preliminary to the United States forces being constitutionally employed to initiate war, "The present usage (internationally) is to publish a manifesto within the territory of the State declaring war, announcing the existence of hostilities and the motives for commencing them."

The constitutional rights of United States citizens in these Islands are amply secured by the United States Constitution.

CLEVELAND'S criticism of the American-Samoan-German compact and his remark that it shows the impolicy of entering alliances with foreign powers, put a sudden end to the yarn about the agreement between the United States and Great Britain as to a joint policy towards Hawaii.

WHAT EVER basis there may be for the pension talk at Washington it is plain from the Neumann power of attorney that Mrs. Dominis stands ready to sell her party out at any time for thirty pieces of silver. We wish it joy of her.

AN AFTERMATH OF NEWS.

STEVENS' HIT AND THURSTON'S HARD KNOCK.

A Scheme to Pension the Ex-Queen - Peixoto's Naval Forces - Other Late News.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—There has been a deal of talk in Washington to-day about the statement of ex-Minister Stevens, given to the public this morning in reply to the report of ex-Minister Blount, who succeeded him at Honolulu. All comment, both in political and diplomatic circles, is to the effect that Stevens has made a most excellent answer to the assertions made by Blount in his reply to all the evidence submitted by this gentleman in reference to the situation on the Islands.

Secretary Gresham was as dumb as an oyster to-day when the Examiner correspondent called upon him at the Arlington Hotel. He absolutely declined to make any reply whatever to the Stevens statement. The Examiner correspondent also called at the Hawaiian Legation and found that Minister Thurston was in New York, and Secretary Hastings did not feel disposed to talk about Stevens' rejoinder.

All gossip to-night where public men congregate is to the effect that Stevens' reply is a most convincing document, and the opinion is that it tears in shreds all the evidence that Blount submitted, and that it makes a most excellent case against the policy this administration has pursued in reference to the restoration of the Queen.

The Evening Star, one of the most conservative papers published in Washington, has this editorial comment on Stevens' statement to-night:

"If fair-minded Americans ever had any doubt as to the prejudiced incapacity of Blount while he was acting as President Cleveland's Minister Paramount in Hawaii that doubt will surely be removed by a careful perusal of the statement by ex-Minister Stevens. No equitable mind can ever be misled either by ex parte testimony gathered by the President's personal agent or by the late-engendered sophistries of Secretary Gresham. There is every evidence of truthfulness in the aggressive defense to which Stevens has been compelled by his bitterly partisan critics and maligners.

"Occasionally Stevens deals in comments of a personal nature, but for this he has ample precedent and sufficient cause. He has been mistreated as no other representative of this or any other great Government ever was. He has been accused of conspiracy and of willful deceit, and he has responded to those grave charges with testimony that cannot be upset and argument of an incontrovertible sort.

"Stevens very charitably makes allowance for Blount's ignorance of diplomatic matters, but the nation cannot easily excuse the engagement in so delicate a matter of incompetence and prejudice when judicial ability is plentiful."

THE HAWAIIAN CAMPAIGN.

Nordhoff Tells a Tale Which is Promptly Denied by Thurston.

NEW YORK, November 30.—The Herald every now and then publishes a letter on Hawaiian affairs written by Charles Nordhoff. Nordhoff was the Herald's correspondent at Honolulu. The following passages are from his letter of November 21st:

"Almost daily meetings were held at Mr. Stevens' house, in which the possibilities of a revolution with a prospect of annexation were discussed. Prominent at these meetings were Chief Justice Judd, Mr. Thurston, Mr. Hartwell, Charles Carter and others, among them Captain Wiltse.

"Fully six months before the revolution Mr. Stevens asked two friends of mine, diplomatic officers, to dinner. They found the only guests besides themselves were Mr. Thurston and Mr. Hartwell. I met them the next day and they expressed to me their disgust at Mr. Stevens. After the first course the annexation question was brought up, and they saw that they had been asked to dine in order that

they might commit themselves. They were on their guard and left the house as soon as the dinner was over."

The foregoing extracts were sent by a friend to Minister Thurston at Washington, and he was asked if Nordhoff's statements were truthful. Mr. Thurston replied as follows:

"Mr. Nordhoff has apparently an unlimited fund of incorrect information about Hawaii. The statements above quoted are about as correct as most of his letters are. The only trouble with the daily meeting story is that I never attended a meeting of any kind at Mr. Stevens' and never met any of the gentlemen named at his house, with the exception of Mr. Hartwell.

"Moreover, I have never discussed the 'possibilities of a revolution upon any occasion with either Captain Wiltse or Chief Justice Judd, and discussed it with Mr. Hartwell and Mr. Carter only after the attempt of the Queen to promulgate a constitution on January 14th last.

"As to the 'dinner' story, I did once dine at Mr. Stevens' house when there were present, besides the ladies of the family, the French and Portuguese diplomatic representatives, Mr. Hartwell and an American naval officer (Captain Muse, if I recollect correctly). I did not hear the subject of annexation or the relations between Hawaii and the United States so much as mentioned. The evening was spent in general conversation, the ladies being present all the time, as I recollect. The guests all left between 9 and 9:30. Early hours are the rule in Honolulu.

"Mr. Nordhoff's letter is the first intimation I ever had that the dinner was anything but a pleasant little social affair of no especial significance. That is all there is to it. The only surprise to me is that, with such material as this to work upon, Mr. Nordhoff did not evolve a much more blood-curdling tale than the rather flat account of a mild attempt to lead France and Portugal from the paths of virtue."

CLEVELAND AND HAWAII.

It is Now Said He Wants to Buy the Queen Off.

CHICAGO, Dec. 3.—A Washington special to the Tribune says: A gentleman here, possessing to an eminent degree the confidence of the highest official circles, says the policy of the Administration toward the Hawaiian Government has been determined on after repeated consultations between Cleveland, Gresham, Blount and several Democratic Senators.

It is proposed to subsidize the Queen, and have her abdicate her claim to the Hawaiian throne. The boldness of the idea is rather startling, but it will give rise to no end of comment in diplomatic circles throughout the world when it is consummated and laid before the legislative branch of the general Government.

The sum to be devoted to the purpose is estimated at \$500,000. It is not to be given to the Queen intact. Simply the interest on the sum is to be paid to her annually on certain conditions. She is to abdicate all claims of every nature to the throne of Hawaii, retaining only an empty title. A Provisional Government satisfactory to the United States is to be established and recognized by the Government at Washington.

The plan of procedure would, if carried into effect, get the Administration out of the dilemma in which it finds itself. The Queen's adherents in Hawaii would, it is said, be pleased to see the plan carried into execution. It would relieve the necessities of the Queen and place her beyond the reach of want for the remainder of her life.

TELEGRAPHIC NOTES.

Minister Mendonca, Brazilian representative at Washington, does not believe that Mello has gone in search of Peixoto's fleet.

The Brazilian warship Destroyer has had her trial trip in which she developed a speed of 16 1/2 knots under forced draught. The Nictheroy is awaiting the America in the West Indies.

The Administration's outrageous course in Hawaii will be overwhelmingly condemned by the American people. Grover Cleveland and his policy, already emphatically repudiated by the voting millions last Tuesday, will be doubly repudiated when this infamy becomes known. The nation whose loyal sons bled on battlefields from Gettysburg to the Rio Grande that a Government of the people, for the people and by the people should not perish from the earth will never sanction the restoration of a justly deposed and degraded monarchy over the sons of Americans in Hawaii. —New York Press.
