OUR DUTY IN THIS CRISIS.

The question of whether the Provisional soldiers should fire upon United States forces in case the latter shall attack their Government, depends to our mind upon whether the Americans come as pirates or as the legal combatants of a power at war.

We need have no fears that such an act would alienate our countrymen at home. No one would know better than they that the invasion had been a foul deed of piracy, a crime against humanity and law.

So much for an act of predatory conquest and its certain issue; but as for any attack upon us which might be legalized by Congress, that would be another matter and only to that should our Government and army yield, and only then under a protest to our countrymen which would end in the restoration of the powers that be.

Fellow citizens, in this crisis the duty of us all is to be Americans, to fight like Americans if the need of battle comes, and to let nothing weaken our firm faith that the people of the great republic are back of us sixty millions strong!

IF FOREIGN FORCES LAND.

In the event of trouble here the British and Japanese forces will undoubtedly come ashore to protect the subjects and property of their respective governments. It would be their duty to do so just as it was that of American marines and seamen to land at Alexandria after the bombardment, at Valparaiso after the capture of that city by Admiral Montt and on the Nicaraguan coast during the troubles of the past summer.

Even if the danger to Democratic supremacy was less the fact that Cleveland is enforcing the Monroe doctrine in Brazil and has lately criticized the last administration for not doing so in Samoa would go to show that he does not contemplate any overthrow of that great American safeguard here.

It is probably true, however, that the peaceful objects of a landing of British troops have been distorted by hostile Englishmen and out of uniform, to encourage the Royalists and dishearten the Annexationists.

Those DREADFUL FEW. It places the ex-Queen's journal to put the defensive strength of the Provisional Government at eighteen leaders and 150 men, and to deride the preparations being made to resist an act of piracy on the part of the forces sent here by Dictator Cleveland.

If the figures of the paper which Mrs. Dominis and the convict-ridden Road Board are presumed to support are in any sense correct what must be the opinion of the world about the party of the second part in the Hawaiian revolution? The confession of the Holomua is that about 99,800 people, all devoted to the monarchy, are held down under the iron heel of 168 "shop-keepers, mechanics and graziers," and held down so hard that they are compelled to shriek for the aid of the United States in restoring them to power.

Time was when an American naval officer would break his sword and burn his commission rather than obey an unlawful order of any kind, least of all one that might enlist him in defense of a throne at the cost of war with his own countrymen.

Any American public man who shall try to overthrow the cause of civil liberty in Hawaii will stand in history beside Benedict Arnold.

THE monarchy can only be restored on the graves of Americans and of the civilization they have founded here by nearly seventy years of toil.
