THE AMERICAN PARTY.

Report on Prof. Koebel's Bug Campaign. Ground Plans Proposed at a League Meeting.

The American League hall was crowded last night. The meeting began at 7:30 and lasted till 11. After careful and exhaustive discussion, which happily was without feeling, the following was adopted:

Plan, for political action during the continuance of the Provisional Government and under its legitimate successors.

Purpose, to secure representation on behalf of all classes of loyal citizens and to have the majority expression from individuals prevail.

There is hereby constituted and created the American party of Hawaii, its fundamental principles are:

1st. Adherence for all time to the cause of political unity with the United States.

2d. Support of the Provisional Government and its legitimate successors.

3d. Agitation and action against Chinese immigration.

4th. The persistent advocacy of American methods of government as laid down in the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States.

5th. A liberal suffrage system that will, first of all, guarantee a vote to every man who has given satisfactory evidence of his intelligence and loyalty to the Provisional Government.

6th. We favor such legislation as will protect the occupancy of all public lands, including those heretofore known as "Crown Lands," by small holders, and foster the development of varied industries, believing it to be of vital importance that "many acres" should be for "many men."

7th. The American Party of Hawaii shall consist of all Leagues and their members on all the Islands.

8th. The executive and administrative branch of the American Party of Hawaii shall be composed of a Central Committee of a League representation to be hereafter determined.

9th. The platform of the American Party of Hawaii shall be prepared by the Central Committee and submitted to each League for amendment and ratification.

10th. The League to be organized at once should be:

AT HALEAKALA.

THEY USE THE BOYCOTT.

CHINESE HAVE PLACED A TABU ON A BUSINESS MAN.

Are After Auctioneer Morgan Political Reasons - A Placed - The Secret Threat.
