HIGHER PRICES FOR HIDES.

In July, 1893, owing to the financial depression, in the United States, or other causes, hides declined in price to the lowest point ever known. Hides that in May brought 5 cents per pound, in July brought only 3 cents. But prices had been steadily declining for two years, now a change is coming. In July last prices again started up, and in the small space of two months a jump from 3 1/2 to 4 1/2 has taken place in San Francisco markets. These prices are for the average Hawaiian hide. This will be cheering news to the Island butcher, as for the past year it has hardly paid him to salt and ship his hides.

All who have hides to sell will please remember we are paying the highest prices for green salted hides.
