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ARRESTS IN NEW YORK.

Only Thirty Per Cent of Those Taken Into Custody Are Women.

Of the total number of arrests in New York, which comprised between 90,000 and 100,000 in a year, 70 per cent of the persons taken into custody are men, and 30 per cent are women. This proportion has been maintained for many years, and varies from it only slightly, but when it comes to the emigrants from continental countries it is seen that the feminine portion of some of these colonies falls to a rather any considerable number of offenders against the laws of this state. According to the last report of the police commission, the arrests for the quarter ending on Jan. 1, 1894, showed 15,597 native born persons taken into custody. Of these 8,403 were men, and 7,194 were women. In other words, about 70 per cent of those arrested were male and 30 per cent female. Substantially the same proportion between the sexes is found among the natives of England, Ireland, Scotland, Canada, Belgium, Bohemia and France, but how is it with the other newcomers?

One thousand five hundred and thirty-eight male natives of Russia were arrested, but instead of 485 female natives of Russia, the normal proportion, there were only 90 arrested in the quarter. This is undoubtedly a very good showing when it is considered how large is the Russian population of this city and how ignorant the great majority of the newcomers of the Russians are of American laws and usages. The Russians of New York are for the most part pitifully poor. Many of them are in trades, such as peddling, street vending and sleep work, which brings them close to the border line of police interference or conflict with each other, but notwithstanding this only 80 Russian women were returned as arrested for any offense, grave or venial, during the last report of the quarter.

While the disparity between the two sexes in the matter of arrests for violations of law is not as strongly marked among the Germans and Scandinavians as it is among the Russians and the Italians, yet it is sufficiently so to justify comment. Twenty-one hundred and ninety-two male Germans were arrested in the last quarter, and only 207 female natives of these countries. Hungarians furnished 101 male and only 14 female arrests, and Austria 344 male and only 13 female arrests during the same quarter. The laws of New York are, it is evident, pretty carefully observed among women, at least by some of those who, in the popular judgment, would seem likely to know least about them—New York stars.

HE WAS GUILTY.

Old Eliakin Hunt was an ex-slave of Halifax county, Va., who was extremely proud of the family name. "Yaas, sah, I was er body sarvant ob ole Marso 'Nori Hunt, wet worried Miss 'Ankie Ellis, Pona de quality El-lises, ober in ole Fluvanner county," he would explain. "Deyse dald an dome gone now, but I ain't gwine furgit we was quality folks."

"Akim was across to work, and when the results of the star made it necessary to shift for himself he concluded that preaching was an easy and at the same time dignified way of getting along. He could rant very effectively and might have succeeded quite well but for a single weakness. Akim was a great "wrecker in pra", as one of his brethren expressed it, "but he do git drunk pow'ful."

Yet the simple people to whom he ministered were not inclined to be very harsh in their judgment of this offense, for their own sins called for such constant exercises of the pardoning power, and 'Akim was very full of the quality of mercy, particularly when the transgressors appeared before him personally. His weakness came up for consideration in the "discipline" meetings from time to time, he was left out, with the simple admonition that he try to keep out of sight of "white folks" when in his cups, the colored folks being peculiarly sensitive to criticism from their former owners.

Repeated condoning of his sin hardened the heart of old 'Akim, and he finally mounted his pulpit one Sunday so drunk that he got into a very mental equilibrium. Deacon S. Jones arose and rebuked him, when the preacher swore at him roundly and accused him of being a chicken thief. The latter offense was not so heinous in the sight of 'Akim's congregation as might be supposed, but it was a mortal affront to be accused of such a transgression, and the deacon having great influence in the body 'Akim was then and there placed upon trial and deposed from the ministry, not for getting drunk, but for calling one of the brethren a pilferer of fowl.

Thenceforward old 'Akim lived upon his wits and his politeness. There were evil minded persons who alleged that much of his revenue was derived from the hen roosts of his neighbors, and what gave color to the charge was the fact that while he sold a great many chickens to the people of a neighboring town he never sold any fowls himself. He had the most ineffable contempt for "poor white trash" and "ocean-fid niggers" and affected intimacy with real quality people.

One day Parson Reddeter, the Methodist circuit rider, met him as he was staggering along the highway from the effects of large potations of moonshine whiskey that had been given him by a party of his neighbors. To a solemnly administered rebuke from the preacher old 'Akim made reply: "Yaas, sah, but de Bible say, 'Drink ob de whisky fur de stomach ache an di di of en information."

Being corrected in his Scriptural quotation, old 'Akim fell back into his impregnable faith. "De quality folks, dey gimme de whisky, an dey is aliers right. Dey gets all de faverin' f'om de Lawd. Po' white trash an de niggers hain't no show wix de Lawd. Huncum he recognize de quality folks' Boleise dey kin do no wrong, an dey done gimme de whisky."

Such was 'Akim's faith. What the quality did could not be wrong. Finally, however, he was caught by a small farmer caught Eliakin in the very act of stealing a pig and forthwith dragged him before Justice Danforth, a member of the same purer aristocracy of Halifax, who asked 'Akim what he had to say in his own defense. This prosecutor told a straightforward and convincing story of the theft, but during the recital the prisoner's ebon countenance expressed contempt, indignation, scorn and incredulity. When he had done, the magistrate asked 'Akim if he had anything to say.

"Marso Danfu'th, axin yer pahdum, but datings is desprately chinged, dat a po' white trash kin com testify agin a quality colored pesson. Dis am wot er come er de niggers hain't no show wix de Lawd. Gimme de Bible, Marso Danfu'th, an I done swear on hit dat I ze nebbor seed dat dere pig."

"This will not do, 'Akim," interrupted the magistrate. "You certainly stole the pig."

"Wot dat you say, Marso Danfu'th? You say I done truck dat pig? Den dat sett it on 'Two guilty for a fact. But I jes' wasn't gwine ter b'lieve it on what der po' white trash man say. In course you knows, you does."

'Akim received his sentence without a murmur, but it was a very mild one, and he went to jail with his faith in the quality unshaken.—Chicago Tribune.
