

BATTALION IN LINE.

THE SIX COMPANIES DRILLED BY COLONEL McLEAN.

Big Crowd Attracted to the Square-Court Martial Findings Read-Notes.

The two regular and four volunteer companies of the First Regiment turned out for drill and parade Wednesday evening. All of them paraded sixteen-file front, double rank. The march was continued from the Drill Shed, through the grounds of the Executive building to Union Square where the battalion was drilled by Colonel McLean. There was a very large crowd of spectators.

At the Drill Shed Colonel McLean addressed the companies, paying a compliment to them on their appearance. He will be present at each company drill next week, and will introduce new features to the routine work.

Each company of the regiment will be drilled with the new Hotchkiss guns.

Captain White, Company B, had charge of his men. He wore a glove over his wounded hand.

The findings of the court martial in the case of Lieutenant King, Company E, and Lieutenant Burgett, Company F, were published after the parade. Lieutenant King was found not guilty and acquitted. Lieutenant Burgett, having pleaded guilty to the charge of "conduct unbecoming a gentleman and an officer" was cashiered from the roll.

Lieutenant Jones, Company D, is a little under the weather. All members will be required to turn out with their respective companies on Memorial Day.

The petition of the school keepers for indemnity for losses by being called during martial law has been referred to the legislature. Authority has been granted for a militia Company of natives and it will be organized next Monday.

DIVORCES IN BRITAIN.

Statistics of Different Countries Presented.

LONDON, May 3.—The Foreign Office publishes today a table giving the number of divorces in foreign countries yearly for the past ten years, the figures having been specially gathered by members of the Consular Corps. In the whole of Great Britain during 1894 but 353 divorces were applied for, while in Germany the total was nearly 7000, and in France 5700. The State of Massachusetts shows up with one divorce to every twenty-two marriages.



THE VANDERBILT DIVORCE. An Example of the Most Perfidious Character Imaginable.

The method by which the Vanderbilt divorce was arranged is a scandal to our jurisprudence. Worse than that, it is an affront to the degradation of public morals and the breaking down of the popular sense of right and wrong. Practically Mr. and Mrs. Vanderbilt divorced themselves. There was no hearing before a court. The parties did not appear before the tribunal. There was no public trial, but the case was arranged in private on either side to serve as a punishment to the guilty party or as a deterrent influence in the case of others. The whole matter was arranged by a lawyer, the only function of the court was to give legal effect to the terms of the bargain. It is, then, the privilege of the rich to annul their marriages at pleasure by mutual agreement. The law, rightly enforced against ordinary citizens, prescribes that collusion between husband and wife shall be an effective bar to any attempt by either to divorce. Yet this rich man and woman have sent their lawyers into court with a collusive agreement, the most flagrant violation of the law, and the court has granted the divorce.
