A TRADE revival is now on the schedule. Instead of being two months distant from delivery, as published in another paper, the new disinfecting plant will be finished in three weeks.

It is really too, too sad that the 'Tiger' has been impelled to shed tears and apologize for the Boston interview of W. R. Castle. Perhaps an explanation from the diplomat will reduce the despair and gloom.

AFTER the furo of the patches irrigated from Kunawai springs is cooked and cut up and burned and thrown away, it might be a good plan to again disinfect Nuuanu stream, pending construction of the walls that are to insure purification by flushing.

IN REMARKING on the statement of the United States Government's financial operations for August, Bradstreet says: "The figures, when they appeared, indicated unfavorable conditions, though less so than for July. Receipts were \$28,952,676, a decrease as compared with August, 1894, of about \$11,500,000, though they were only \$144,000 less than in July. The expenditures were \$32,588,184, an increase of \$931,548 over the record of August, 1894."

IT WAS anticipated that the chief danger to the country in the advertising line would be at the hands of local correspondents of foreign papers. This is what one of them said under date of September 16th, after the epidemic was well in control, when natives were right at the front in support of the Board of Health: "It is predicted that unless the disease abates or some change is made in its management the natives may revolt and resort to riots and incendiarism." Of course there was not at the time the slightest justification for such a statement as this.

ONE of the physicians on the Board of Health has stated, officially, that he is unable to find a record of prohibition of transit of new goods during even a cholera epidemic. This should be enough, taken with the trade exigencies of the occasion, to warrant an allowance of traffic again. It is well of course for the Board to be cautious in health matters, for it has responsibility in that field. However, nothing short of a general breaking up of everything can serve as a pretext or cause or reason for suppression of business. It is pleasing to see that the Board is now disposed to be more reasonable, more considerate of commerce.

ONE of the bright writers of the Chicago Times-Herald has taken up the subject of cholera. He says that should the plague invest the United States from this direction it would be coming from an entirely new route. The starter for the three epidemics the States have had has come from Europe. Primarily the pilgrims carry the disease. Cholera has never yet originated outside India. It has always been traced to Bengal, and the back track of every epidemic leads to the spring gatherings of half a million people at Hurdwar. Ernest Hart, editor of the British Medical Journal, never fails an opportunity to urge upon his Government sanitary reform in India. He says: "By rigorous inspection of all pilgrims leaving that country, by prohibiting pilgrimages when necessary, Great Britain can wipe cholera off the face of the earth, for no other infectious disease is so easily managed as cholera."

THE Marquis of Fontenoy writes that Japan's emperor will likely visit Europe and the United States next year, escorted by a magnificent fleet of war ships and merchant vessels composed in part of trophies of the recent Oriental war. If the Pacific is crossed by the royal part a brief stay will most likely be made in Hawaii. The emperor and his associates take a deep interest in their people now in these Islands. How Japan has raced ahead. Twenty-eight years ago the Mikado was invisible to all but officials of his palace at Kioto. His ministers were permitted to secure his instructions only from behind a screen which concealed his features. If he happened to pass through the streets every one was compelled to remain prostrate, with face to the ground, under penalty of death. The last three decades have, however, worked a marvelous change in Japanese ideas. The Tokio police have been compelled to issue regulations insisting that the people should doff their hats and stand aside when the Mikado passes through the streets, so familiar had his presence become to his subjects.

OFFICE OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH, HONOLULU, October 2, 1895. The Regulation of the Board of Health of September 4, 1895, forbidding the holding of meetings in the District of Honolulu, has this day been rescinded. By order of the Board of Health. WILLIAM O. SMITH, President.

OFFICE OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH, HONOLULU, October 4, 1895. All bills, on account of the expenses for the suppression of the Cholera epidemic, for supplies furnished up to and including October 5, are ordered to be presented at the Office of the Board of Health, not later than 12 o'clock noon, October 7, 1895, to be audited for payment. To ensure prompt payment, all bills must have the approval of the officer who incurred the same. WILLIAM O. SMITH, President of the Board of Health.

HEADQUARTERS FIRST REGIMENT, NATIONAL GUARD OF HAWAII, HONOLULU, R. H., October 4, 1895. GENERAL ORDERS NO. 12. Companies "A," "B," "C," "D," "E," "F," and "G," First Regiment, N. G. H., will assemble at the Armory at 7:30 sharp, THIS EVENING, (Friday) October 4. The companies when formed will take post at discretion on the parade ground under their company commanders and await orders. Uniform, blue cap and coat, white trousers and leggings. Sickness will be the only excuse accepted for non-attendance. By command of COLONEL McLEAN.

OFFICE OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH, HONOLULU, October 3, 1895. Schools may be opened in the District of Honolulu except the schools situated in the infected locality. No children from the infected locality are allowed admission to any school in the "Infected Locality" that portion of the District lying within the following boundaries, namely: From the harbor along Maunakea street to Beretania street, along Beretania street to Nuuanu street, along Nuuanu street to Vineyard street, along Vineyard street to Nuuanu stream, along Nuuanu stream and Fuchuehu stream to Judd street, along Judd street west to the foot-hills, along the base of the foot-hills to the road bounding the Kamehameha School premises on the east, thence a line drawn in extension of said road to the sea.
