ADJUSTING THE MORALS. CONSIDERING PROPOSED REPEAL OF THE ACT TO MITIGATE.

The House Committee on House Bills Nos. 17 and 19, relating to the Act to Mitigate, met at 2 p. m. Friday and E. C. Bond acted as chairman.

Rev. Peck led the attack on the present law and was supported by Rev. Bingham, F. W. Damon, W. A. Bowen, Prof. Richards and one or two others. Dr. C. T. Rodgers, Attorney-General Smith, A. G. M. Robertson, Dr. Andrews and other practical men familiar with operation of the present law opposed its repeal.

A vote on whether or not the Act should be repealed resulted for the affirmative. Dr. Rodgers declared the house to be "stuffed" for the purpose, and said if he had known a vote would be taken he would have had his friends present.

During his final "kick" against the law, Rev. Peck was offered a commission by the Attorney-General to try his hand at checking the evil. The offer was accepted.

At 7:30 Friday evening the House Committee, accompanied by Dr. Monsarrat and officer David Naholewa, visited the section of the city of which so much has been said. All of the houses were inspected in detail, and the women questioned.

Organized by President Hosmer of Oahu. Scott heads the List-A Schedule Presented—Shakespeare to Be Read.

A great reading circle for the benefit of students, ex-students and friends has been instituted by President Hosmer of Punahou College. Scott is first, to be followed by Shakespeare. Here is circular No. 1:

In September, 1880, Dr. William Everett presented to Williams' College the complete works of Sir Walter Scott, accompanied by the following letter:

"I had little hesitation in selecting the author of whose works I should be glad to acceptance by your library. From my very earliest infancy both my parents sedulously impressed upon my childish ear that Sir Walter Scott's writings, both in verse and prose, were indispensable to anybody who was to read and know the literature of our language at all, and that he was among the only accredited authors that no child need be cautioned against reading. It no more occurred to me throughout my youth to question this than it did to avoid the love of my family. To know and love Sir Walter Scott was as natural and charming as to know and love a young brother or a kind nurse. Nor have I, since I began to think and choose for myself, and to seek for models of literature in every age where literature has been, found a single writer at once more enlivening and more quieting, or one dearer to my ear and more suggestive to my mind, than the best of his. I believe now, as I believed forty-seven years ago, that whoever is to know English literature, should begin with Scott and keep him up till we come to the day, as Scott himself said, 'There is but one book.'
