

WALKING UP.

Thirty-Five Chinese Strikers on the

Way from Ewa Plantation.

There has been trouble at Ewa with the thirty-six big Amoy Chinamen sent down a few days ago. Tuesday morning they refused to work and were all arrested. They were brought before the district magistrate of Ewa this morning and committed indefinitely on the charge of refusing duty. They are being walked to Honolulu this afternoon and will be kept in jail here until they are willing either to fulfill their contracts or return home. The men have given no special reason for refusing to work.

Settling a Dispute in a Chinese Newspaper Office.


