### A THOROUGH AMERICAN

CAPT. NATHAN APPLETON OF REVOLUTIONARY STOCK.

Was One of the Competitive Drill Judges—Praises the Companies—Good as Regulars—Friends Here.

Capt. Nathan Appleton of Boston, who is at present visiting Honolulu, is a prominent man in the social and political life of his state. His title comes from a commission held by him during the war. After that he was for a long time captain of an artillery company in Massachusetts. Since then he has not been actively associated with the military.

The distinguished visitor was a judge of the recent competitive drill. Of that event he says: "The occasion was exceedingly gratifying to me. I desired to see what the volunteers of Hawaii could do. It would not be too much to say that the drill was as excellent as I have ever seen anywhere. I could hardly believe the perfectly disciplined companies before me were only militia. Their work would be a credit to many bodies of regular troops."

Capt. Appleton is with Edward Jacob Forster and Hon. Henry Cabot Lodge one of the vice presidents of the Massachusetts' society of the Sons of the American Revolution and is pleased to see away out here on the Pacific a chapter of that society, so well organized and efficient. Mr. Appleton, according to the Massachusetts Society year book of the Sons of the American Revolution, "is a grandson of Isaac Appleton of New Ipswich, New Hampshire (1731-1806); member of the Provincial Congress, 1775; carried the news of Concord fight from New Ipswich to Peterboro, and marched to Cambridge next morning 'before daylight, not stopping to take leave of his family, though he passed near his own door;' private in Capt. Smith's company, September 21, 1776, and was present at White Plains; member of the committee of correspondence and safety 1777-1780."

Capt. Appleton is stopping at the Hawaiian hotel. He is well acquainted with Gen. A. S. Hartwell and other prominent people of the city. Since the competitive drill he has devoted much of his time to sight seeing.

### BOYS' CIRCUS.

The Season of Taeki and Kachiel Show Now Ended.

Taeki and Kachiel, who were with the tent shows so well known in Honolulu are now attending school here and are proving bright pupils. At the tail of the late vacation the lads organized a circus of fifteen trained boys and an educated goat that would only perform in the daytime. The shows have been given with marked success, the season concluding last night. The tent was pitched up Nuuanu stream off Vineyard street and the prices were ten cents and five cents. Then the tumbling and air work on trapeze and rings proceeded, together with the appearance of two clowns. The show was very good till near the finale, when an important act had to be omitted on account of Kachiel's special suit bing in the laundry. Besides that Welsh made Kachiel mad, Taeki was disgusted because the house was only 85 cents, the dressing room collapsed and it rained on the roofless ring. The strong man, who is also prominent in the management, was unavoidably in Waikiki. Still, the pretty young heiress and the others of the audience were satisfied. There will be a reorganization and another season in about three weeks.


