ALL ALONG THE DOCKS

IWALANI ARRIVES WITH A LIGHT SUGAR CARGO.

Kinau's Run—Foreign Arrivals at Other Ports—The 'Round the Horn Fleet—Kaala—Front Notes.

The Lohua arrived from Paunhan this morning, bringing a load of sugar from that plantation for W. G. Irwin & Co.

The Brig Consuelo, Capt. Christiansen, has arrived at Mahukona after a smart passage of eleven days from San Francisco and will have quick dispatch.

The Kaala came in from the weather side of the island last night. Her cargo consisted of 25 bundles of hides only. She will sail on Monday at noon for her regular Oahu ports.

The bark Gainsborough was hauled up on the marine railway at 1 p. m. today. The statement that the bark nearly capsized yesterday is entirely without foundation.

The Iwalani arrived at 5 o'clock this morning from Hamakua. She brought 350 bags of Kuluhaele sugar for F. A. Schaefer & Co., which were hauled to the Oceanic warehouse for shipment to New York. The Iwalani will sail for Hamakua ports again on Monday at 3 p. m.

The four-masted schooner Muriel, N. S. Carlson commander, sailed from Honolulu for San Francisco on the 6th inst with a cargo of 14,796 bags of sugar, weighing 1,864,296 pounds and valued at \$50,837.07, shipped by Theo. H. Davies & Co., Ltd., and 163 hides, shipped by R. R. Hind, valued at \$298; total domestic value, \$51,135.12.

The John McDonald, which arrived in New York on September 30, took 58,000 bags of sugar from this port, sailing June 1st. The next vessel to leave here was the J. H. Thomas, on June 13th, with 47,000 bags of sugar, valued at \$211,975. Probably her arrival will be noted in the next mail.

The steamer Kinau arrived from windward ports at 1:30 p. m. yesterday. She made the run from Lahaina to Honolulu in 5 hours and 43 minutes, just 3 minutes longer than on her last trip. Her cargo consisted of 161 sheep, 100 hides, 397 bags spuds and corn, 25 hogs 4 horses and 250 packages sundries. She had also a large passenger list.

The brigantine John D. Spreckels, S. N. Christiansen master, arrived at Mahukona on the 11th inst. ten and one half days from San Francisco. She brought an assorted cargo, consisting of 300 cases coal oil, 46 cases crackers, 18 bales hay, 8005 pounds meal, 16,051 pounds barley, 400 barrels flour, 16,314 pounds bran. She is consigned to the Hawaiian Railroad Co. Her consignees being Kohala Sugar Co., S. G. Wilder & Co., and Theo. H. Davies & Co. The spreckels took on a load of sugar at Mahukona and sailed for San Francisco yesterday.

Birds Are More Agile Than Man.

In a recently made comparison of the capability of rapid motion available to man with that of the lower animals it is shown that so far, even with the aid of steam and electricity, man's mechanical contrivances have been unable to equal the flight of many of the birds. The wildest theory places the speed of the future bicycle railroad trains, propelled by electricity on elevated tracks, at considerably less than 200 miles an hour, but this is the extraordinary velocity that the frigate bird is supposed to be capable of attaining. The falcon can easily overtake the pigeon in a race, and, according to a moderate estimate, it travels twice as fast as an ordinary carrier pigeon. Well trained falcons have covered 70 miles in an hour, and hawks are said to have made 150 miles in the same length of time.—Exchange.
