ALL ALONG THE DOCKS

VESSELS CHARTERED TO TAKE SUGAR AROUND THE HORN.

Collier Arrives—Movements of Island Craft—Diamond Head—Rosalie—China Sails—Front Notes.

The Kaala, which sailed late Thursday, took a load of coal for Kahuku.

The bark Samoa is being scraped and will be given a new coat of paint.

The Hawaiian bark Diamond Head will sail during the afternoon for San Francisco.

The extra steamer to leave Japan tomorrow in the Seattle line will not call at this point.

The Waialeale sailed about 2 o'clock this afternoon with 100 tons of coal for Makaweli plantation.

The Hawaii will sail at noon tomorrow for Honolulu, Honoumua, Hakalau, Pookahumau and Papaikou.

The Kuni arrived this morning from the Garden Island. She brought 6500 bags sugar from Waimea.

The Waialeale arrived at 5 o'clock this morning from Kauai with no freight. Had fine weather. Left Iwawani at Eleele.

The P. M. S. S. China sailed at 10 o'clock this morning for San Francisco. She took on a little over 300 tons of coal at this port.

The fire started in Haekfeld's coal pile yesterday was extinguished without much trouble. A hose line to a hydrant did the business.

Two laddies of the bark Snowdon had a tiff yesterday and settled it after work hours on the Esplanade. Both were quite severely battered.

Capt. Nissen, of the Rosalie, had some trouble with his sailors, which prevented his departure yesterday for Esquimaux. The men had a little money and were determined to "celebrate" as long as it lasted. Capt. Nissen conceded the point and postponed sailing until today.

The British bark Woolahra, Capt. Barneson, was sighted about 2 p. m. Thursday and came in at dark. She was sixty days from Newcastle and brought 1372 tons coal for W. G. Irwin & Co. The Woolahra is in the stream, where she will have to wait several days for a place to discharge.

The barks Samoa, Snowdon and Oakbank will load Nos. 2 and 3 sugar at this port for New York. The Samoa and Oakbank already have about 2,000 bags each aboard. This is the first time other than American vessels have been chartered for this trade. All three of the barks are British.
