ISLAND STEAMERS GETTING OUT WITH FULL LOADS.

Claudine for Maui—Mokolii—Lurline to Have Repairs Made Here—A Bit of a Race Out to Diamond Head.

The bark Ceylon leaves the Marine railway today.

The James Makee will sail at 4 this afternoon for Kapaa.

The Kinau arrived this afternoon from Maui and Hawaii.

The S. N. Castle will not be able to get away until next week.

The Woolahra is taking ballast today and will sail the last of the week for the Sound.

The Claudine for Maui, W. G. Hall for Kama, and Mokolii for Molokai all sail at 5 this afternoon.

The W. G. Hall will not call at Makaweli this trip. She will go to Nu-uwilli, Hanamaulu and Koloa.

Upon instructions from San Francisco the brig Lurline will go on the Marine railway here for repairs.

Friends of Capt. E. H. Parker, are congratulating him on being promoted to the command of the Ke Au Hou.

The schooners Mille Morris and Sarah-and-Eliza will sail during the afternoon for Koolau and Waiatua respectively.

A Portland dispatch states that the big ship Henry Villard has sailed from that point for Honolulu to load sugar for New York.

The Hilo schooner Ada will leave during the afternoon for Koolau, making one trip for the Kawallani, which is laid up for an overhauling.

The Japanese steamer Kinshui Maru in the Seattle line, will fall due at this port on Thursday from Yokohama. Irwin & Co. are the agents.

A big send-off was given the Mauna Loa this morning. Several hundreds of people were on the wharf and the Royal Hawaiian band played her off.

The rupture between sailors of the collier White Rose has resulted in the arrest of three men. They have been charged with assault and battery on the mate.

The Mikahala will return Thursday morning with 2000 bags of sugar to complete the cargo of the Aloha. The latter will sail on the afternoon of the same day for San Francisco.

The Kaala and J. A. Cummins left port together yesterday morning and had a pretty race until off Waikiki, when the Inter Island boat began to show the other her heels.

The Andrew Welch moved down to the foot of Nuuanu street this morning and made place for the Kikitat at Wilder's wharf, where the latter will discharge her cargo of lumber.

Mail for the C. A. S. S. Mowera arrived at the dock ahead of time. The vessel was not ready to sail on schedule and did not get away until about fifteen minutes after the mail was aboard.

The Japanese tramp steamer Shinshu Maru arrived this morning from Kobe, consigned to the Kobe Immigration Co. She brought 352 Japanese "students" and 5 Japanese steerage for Honolulu. Today she is in naval row discharging her passengers and their baggage.

On her way to Honolulu the Marie Hackfeld was spoken by the British bark Blengfell, Liverpool to Brisbane, and asked by the captain for arms and ammunition. An Australian dispatch states that a mutiny broke out later on the vessel and that two men were killed. Capt. Kruse did not furnish the arms requested.
