ACTIVE MOVEMENT IN THE FLEET OF COASTERS.

Hall Escaped Storm—Mokolii Met: Bad Weather—Makee on the Ways—Lurline Off—Australia.

Australia tomorrow. The Mokolii will sail at 5 this afternoon for Molokai.

The Kilauea Hou will sail at 4 p. m. tomorrow for Hawaii.

The Alice Cooke took the place of the Woollahra at New wharf.

The Mauna Loa will return tomorrow afternoon from Hawaii.

The Kilauea Hou returned empty from Hawaii Sunday afternoon.

The Kaala and J. A. Cummins sailed at 10 this morning for Oahu ports.

The Mikahala will sail at 5 p. m. for Makaweli, Waimea, Kekaha and Niihau.

The Lehua arrived early Sunday morning from Hawaii, with 2507 bags of sugar.

The schooner Norma has been leased to the Montague-Faust Co. for use among the islands.

The Likelike will get away at 4 p. m. Wednesday for the usual ports on Hawaii and Maui.

The Waialeale will make one trip on the Makee's route, sailing at 4 this afternoon for Kapaa.

The W. G. Hall was at Hanamaui during the storm Wednesday night and escaped the heavy blow.

The British bark Woollahra sailed today for Humboldt Bay, where she will take lumber for Australia.

The Andrew Welch took the sugar brought by the Ke Au Hou. She will sail about Thursday for the Coast.

The Mokolii got in Sunday morning from Molokai. She experienced some bad weather while on this trip.

The bark Samoa took the sugar brought by the W. G. Hall. She will sail the last of this week for New York.

The Ke Au Hou returned yesterday from Hanakua with a deck load of cattle. She reports settled weather on Hawaii.

The Claudine arrived early Sunday morning from Maui with few passengers, 2507 bags sugar and a cargo of general produce.

The James Makee took the Lurline's place on the Marine railway late Saturday for repairs. Workmen were engaged upon her all day Sunday.

Hano, an old native, while under the influence of liquor, walked off the Oceanic wharf late Saturday night. He was rescued by sailors of the Samoa.

The W. G. Hall returned Sunday morning from Kauai with a big cargo of sugar, aggregating 5149 bags. She will sail again at 5 p. m. Tuesday on the same route.

The Lurline will go back on the Marine railway after the Makee comes down. From here she will go to Kahului in about two weeks to load sugar for San Francisco.

In a few days the old clam shell dredger will be taken out from her moorings back of the Pacific Mail wharf and put to work on the site of the new wharf slips.

The Kinshu Maru landed the last of her freight this morning. Her laborers will be shipped out today and tomorrow and she will sail about Wednesday afternoon for Yokohama.

During the storm Wednesday night the B. P. Cheney pulled up the post at the Pacific Mail wharf to which she was moored. Carpenter Jarrett was engaged today planting it again.

Another ship of freight clerks in the I. I. S. N. service, Drew, of the Kaala, leaves to accept a place at Castle and Cooke's; Bickerton takes the Kaala; Pickard the Waialeale and Tuft the James Makee.


