VERDICT OF SUICIDE.

Jury Finds that Alex Gray Killed Himself.

Deputy Marshal Hitchcock held an inquest into the death of Alex. Gray this morning. A jury composed of F. McIntyre, J. O. Carter, Jr., Ed. Norrie, Mr. Hagerup, Mr. Sharp and Mr. Mossman was empaneled. After hearing the evidence the jury found that Gray had ended his own life.

From the testimony gleaned at the inquest it was learned that the suicide had threatened self destruction on several occasions. He must have planned death during the day for the string tied to the trigger of the rifle and attached to his foot, was braided during the afternoon by him. He asked some girls stopping at his uncle's house whether Auld was going to the auction last night. They replied in the affirmative and he answered that he would probably change his plans. He went out and never returned. It is believed he killed himself at about 8 o'clock. The bullet lodged in his brain.

EXTRA SESSION. WASHINGTON, March 4.—President McKinley will tomorrow issue a proclamation for an extra session to meet March 15th. At the Hays dinner last night a suggestion was made that the extra session begin March 20th. "No," said McKinley, with an emphasis that indicated his fixed determination, "I have concluded that the best interests of the country demand that we should get to work at the earliest practicable moment. Ten days will be sufficient to enable members to reach Washington. I will issue a call for a session on Friday."

BUTLER'S CASE.

Grounds on Which He Will Claim Release.

Murderer Butler is destined to remain here many moons yet, says the Chronicle of the 5th inst. His case will be carried to the United States Supreme Court on a certain appeal of an application for habeas corpus.

These are, in substance, the grounds upon which a writ of habeas corpus is asked for: The prisoner is not Frank Butler, or Frank Harwood, or Lee Weller, or any of the other aliases under which he is confined. He is John Newman, a British subject, who has committed no crime against the laws of California or the City and County of San Francisco. He is here detained and deprived of his personal liberty by Barry Baldwin, United States Marshal for the northern district of California. He was arrested while on British territory—the British flag covering the Swahilda and her cargo—and while on his way from one part of the British domain to another. He was not seeking the United States as an asylum or a refuge, and was forcibly and against his will removed from the British vessel in which he came from Australia.

WEYLER BACK IN HAVANA.

HAVANA, March 4.—Captain General Weyler returned to Havana today. He denied that he has resigned, and added that he has not even contemplated it.
