AGAINST DISCRIMINATION.

Sharpshooters and Citizens' Guard Disapprove of Military Action.

Captain Wall, First Lieutenant McLean, Second Lieutenant Cassidy, Messrs. Emerson and Wood were chosen a special committee at the Sharpshooters' meeting last night to confer with a like committee of the Citizens' Guard, to choose an appropriate manner of informing the President of their disapproval of the action of the military in insisting upon preferment in the matter of Government being given to the members of the National Guard.

The matter was freely discussed at the meeting. The feeling of every sharpshooter present was that his organization was just as loyal in its support of the republic as the military, and they could see no just reason for any discrimination against them.

The various companies of the Citizens' Guard will meet shortly and a call for an expression of opinions will be made. The Mounted Reserve will also probably join in the movement, the aim of the military officers being to have the discrimination in the matter of office gifts extended against other organizations supporting the Government outside of the National Guard.

ALL ALONG THE DOCKS

INTER ISLAND COAL PILE MUST BE TURNED OVER.

Steamship Captain's Son Stowed Away on the Mohican—Was a British Ship—Gossip of the Front.

There is no sign of the Aorangi as yet.

The Mohican carried away 1322 tons of sugar—a full cargo. She sailed at 10 o'clock.

The Gaelic is due from Yokohama tomorrow, but the chances are that she will be in tonight.

The Noeau is on the boards to sail at 10 o'clock Monday morning for Lahaina, Honokaa and Kukuhaele.

The Mokoli arrived this morning with 100 sheep, one horse, a band of pigs and a lot of miscellaneous freight. She also brought 16 passengers.

The Waiialeale and Ke Au Hou arrived this morning, the latter with 4125 bags of sugar and 26 head of cattle, and the former with 2850 bags of sugar.

Jack Storrs, a son of Capt. Storrs of the British tramp ship Progresso, now in the Pacific coast coal trade, was found stowed away on the bark Mohican as she was ready to go to sea. The youth came here several weeks ago as a stowaway aboard the Kenilworth and has been loafing about the town ever since. He has made several previous attempts to get away in vessels bound for the coast.

The Noeau passed quite close yesterday morning to the strange ship that passed the port, southward bound. Purser Kelly reports that the stranger was deep in the water. She carried the British flag, and made an effort to signal her name, but the numbers could not be made out from the steamer. Shipping men are at loss to know what British vessel, laden and headed to the southward, could be found in this part of the world.

The deluge of water poured upon the Inter Island Company's coal pile yesterday was sufficient to check the fire, but it also imposed the chances for another fire, as wet coal piled upon dry coal is considered a dangerous combination. This morning Capt. Campbell had a large force of men at work turning the coal over and piling it in a new place. It is quite a task, as there are many thousand tons of coal in the pile. The engine is standing by, ready to render assistance should the blaze break out again.
