SUGAR TRUST AND BEETS

THE TWO INTERESTS ARE NOW COMBINED.

Both Unite to Beat the Annexation Treaty—Money to Be Used Like Water—Approaching Senators.

WASHINGTON, June 28.—Desperate means are being resorted to by the Sugar Trust and the beet sugar interest to defeat the Hawaiian annexation treaty. There is ground for the assertion that money will be used without stint to influence the Senate against ratification. Traces of it have already begun to appear.

Should the sugar combine persist in the campaign upon which they have entered the discussion of the treaty next winter will be the occasion of a scandal exceeding all the other sugar scandals of recent years. No time has been lost in getting in the work against the treaty. It is less than a fortnight since the President's message was sent to the Senate, and in that time several Senators have been approached in a way which leaves no doubt as to the plan of action of the opponents of annexation.

There has been a conference within the last few days in which several Northwestern Senators took part. It was a secret conference, and the plans of the sugar barons were fully discussed. Just what was the nature of the arguments employed need not be inquired into too closely, but when the conference broke up it was with the understanding that those present should vote against the treaty, although they had hitherto, with one exception, been supposed to favor annexation. They were all silver men, and they are all in close touch with the sugar ring.

It is not believed by the friends of annexation that the mercenary tactics of the opposition can prevail in the end, for there is a large majority in the Senate favorable to annexation, which cannot be brought over by such appeals as are being made by the sugar people. This majority is not two-thirds, and it may be that ratification of the treaty may be prevented by tampering with Senators who would naturally support it, but annexation can be brought about in a more direct and speedy way, and if it should appear that a two-thirds majority could not be had for ratification, the Administration could carry out its purpose by means of such a bill as was introduced in the Senate by Morgan of Alabama last week, incorporating in a legislative enactment the main provisions of the treaty. Such a bill would pass both House and Senate with little trouble, for there are fifty votes of the eighty-nine in the Senate which will stand by annexation in any guise, and the annexationists have an even larger majority in the House.

The sugar interests have always been opposed to annexation. The sugar production of Hawaii alone is hardly sufficient to interfere seriously with any American industry, and the free admittance of Hawaiian sugar is not such a menace as would justify the desperate measures taken to prevent it. In the last six months of 1896 the imports from Hawaii were only 175,342,857 pounds, against 1,631,921,465 pounds imported from other countries and subject to duty. This amount is not sufficient to affect the market injuriously.


