TOWN'S DEFEAT REGIMENTS ON SATURDAY.

Damon Wins His Match With King—Other Races at Cylomere—Ex-Lieut Colonel Game at Makiki.

Princess Kaiulani with her friends occupied the Bruce Waring stand at Cylomere park Saturday evening. Her guests included Mr. and Mrs. James Boyd, Mrs. Robertson, the Misses and Helen Parker, Miss May Hart, Miss Holmes, Miss Ward, Miss Robertson, Miss Widemann, Messrs. A. S. Cloghorn, Dr. Eagan, Carl Widemann, B. Woodhouse, Donald Ross, A. Robertson and Anapuna.

The closing night's performances were witnessed by nearly 3,500 people. Fred Damon won the mile match race over Tom King, who was not in the pink of condition. The first and second heats were made in exactly the same time, 2:21.

The mile open for novices was won by T. Lloyd, Coves finishing second. Treadway and Jackson qualified in the first heat and Coves and Lloyd in the second.

George Sharrick won the mile open professional in 2:36, Allan Jones coming in second. The parcourers, Harvey and Lishman, John Sylvia and D. G. Sylvester, fell in the outset of this race.

Ed Kong captured a half mile race with six other Orientals in the field. S. Arno was second. Time 1:22 1/2.

Honey Giles secured first place in the mile handicap for amateurs. He had a handicap of 60 yards and his time was 2:29 3/4. Ludloff was second. Fred Damon started in this race but did not finish. His two strong rides in the match race were too much for him.

Dan Whitman won first place in the two-thirds mile handicap professional. Sharrick crossed the tape second and Jones third. The time, 1:29 4/5.

John Sylvia won one-third mile exhibition in 39 flat. He was paced by Harvey and Lishman. This gives Sylvia the island record, lowering his own previous record one second.

Sylvester ride a third in 39 3/4.

George Sharrick went over the same distance in 37 1/2. He was paced by Whitman and Jones.

Henry Giles established an amateur record for the track by going a third in 40 1/2, just three-fifths of a second better time than that of his little brother, Arthur Giles.

The Davies cricketers won Saturday's cricket match over the Honolulu cricketers by a score of 54 to 52.
