WHAT SAILOR MEN TALK OF

R. M. S. AORANGI AND U. S. S. ADAMS ARRIVE.

Claudine Sails for Hilo Tomorrow—Boat Boys Capture a Big Fish—Water Front Notes and Gossip.

The R. M. S. Aorangi sails at 3 p. m. for the Colonies. Very rough weather is reported on the Kauai coast, and it is impossible to work sugar at many landings.

The Thillie E. Starbuck will receive her first consignment of sugar today, consisting of 500 bags from the James Makee.

The schooner Emma and Louisa did have a Boat aboard. It was stowed away amid ships, nearly covered up with hay.

The Wainalea and Mikahala met in the channel yesterday morning, and Captains Gregory and Thompson again exchanged commands, the latter going back into the Mikahala and Gregory taking the Wainalea to Kauai.

The repairs on the Kinau will be completed in time for her to take her route on January 4th. If she has the time she will go on the marine railway for a scraping before sailing. She has been seven months off the railway.

The Claudine will sail at noon tomorrow for Hilo and way ports, on the Kinau's route, leaving a day in advance of time so as to arrive in Hilo on Christmas eve, and remain in port over the holidays. After this trip she will take her own route again.

The James Makee arrived late yesterday afternoon with 2704 bags of Hanamaulu sugar, most of which goes into the Alice Cooke. She had a rough experience and was unable to load at Kilauea, whither she was sent. Purser Christian reports about 14,000 bags of sugar left on Kauai.

The Ke Au Hou is having a hard time of it on the Kauai coast, according to Captain Tullet of the James Makee. She left here nine days ago, and up to the time the Makee left had not been able to land her Kailiwal freight. She is loading sugar at Kilauea, where the swell is high. On Monday the water was so low along the wharf that it was possible only to load thirty bags on a boat.

The Kaala got in yesterday from Kahuku, with 1500 sugar and 500 rice. Owing to the rough weather prevailing she was bar bound two days. Provisions ran short on Sunday morning, and Captain Mosher was forced to slaughter his Christmas turkey to keep the wolf from the door. Now he wants to know who will pay for the bird. Sufficient provisions were secured from the shore for the remainder of the trip, so that the crew did not suffer.

The U. S. training ship Adams arrived off port last night and came in benefit of eighty apprentices she has aboard, and will remain in port here over the holidays. The Adams has been here on several occasions, the last time in August last. On her present cruise she left San Diego on November 21, sailing nearly all the way to Hilo, where she arrived on the 14th inst. She left there for this port last Monday, coming down under sail.

The R. M. S. Aorangi, Captain Hepworth, arrived off port bright and early this morning, but a day behind her schedule time, and by 7 o'clock was alongside the Mail wharf. She left Victoria on the afternoon of the 13th inst., and had a pleasant run down. The Aorangi brings 330 tons of cargo for this port, consisting of the following items: 14 barrels or salmon, 210 drums of fish, 40 boxes of rubber, 549 barrels of beer, 35 boxes of beer, 1274 barrels of lime, 35 tiers of lard, 37 cases dry goods, 16 boxes of poultry and 86 packages of sundries. The Aorangi is in good running order now, and is expected in the
