KINDERGARTNERS' BOARD

MEETING OF TRUSTEES IN QUEEN EMMA HALL.

Mrs. Thompson Presented With Flowers—Resignation of Mrs. J. B. Atherton—Prof. Agassiz Visits Schools.

The Kindergarten Board of Trustees met this morning at Queen Emma hall. There was a full attendance of officers present, indeed it was the most largely attended meeting that has been held. The business, however, was not very considerable and was soon arranged.

Mrs. Thompson's work was commended by the Trustees and the hope was expressed that she might soon recover from her sickness, which she contracted while in the discharge of her charitable duties. Her work has not been given up however, for girls from Kawaiahae and Kamehameha carry it on, and, so far, successfully.

This morning all the children from the Chinese Kindergarten marched in a body to the Queen's Hospital and presented Mrs. Thompson with floral offerings. The secretary of the Kindergarten Association was directed to write to Mrs. Thompson and express the sympathy of the Trustees and the earnest hope that she would soon recover.

Mrs. J. B. Atherton resigned her position as chairman of the Kindergarten at Ewa plantation. The resignation was accepted with great regret. No appointment has yet been made in Mrs. Atherton's place.

The secretary reported two mothers' meetings during the month. One was held for Hawaiian women and one for Japanese. Each of these meetings was presided over by Miss Lawrence who stated that the mothers of each nationality seemed deeply interested in the information imparted, and she felt sure that much good was accomplished by the talks. Some thirty women were present on each occasion.

It was reported that Professor Agassiz was visiting the Kindergartens of the city and that he had expressed in high terms about their management. Professor Agassiz's sister takes a prominent part in the Kindergarten movement in Boston and the professor is naturally much interested in the subject.

LAI'D AT REST.

Funeral of Miss Anna Cahill Took Place This Afternoon.

The remains of Miss Anna Cahill, who died at the Sanitarium last evening, were interred in the Catholic cemetery on King street this afternoon. The funeral took place from the Catholic cathedral at 3 o'clock. Father Matthias conducted the service and Father Valentine led the choir.

The pall bearers included T. J. Fisher, D. B. Smith, J. Hawkins, Peter Lucas, Vida Thuram and J. F. Eckhardt. Miss Cahill made out her will a few days previous to her death. Her sister, Mrs. Callahan, of Cleveland, Ohio, is the heir.

HOODLEMS.

Hulu and Pahoe, native lads of 14 or thereabouts, are locked up at the police station today on a charge of assault and battery upon Lim Lin, a Chinese, who keeps a little store up Minoa valley. According to Lan's story the boys entered his place yesterday afternoon and asked for a dime's worth of cigars. The Chinaman laid three Manillas on the counter, which one of the boys grabbed and started to run off with. Then the second boy participated. Both Chinamen received a severe beating. Detective Kaapa captured the boys this morning.

CORONATION OF WILHELMINA.

The coronation of Queen Wilhelmina of the Netherlands which is to take place during the first part of September, 1898, is to be one of the most magnificent ceremonies ever witnessed. The rejoicings will last five days, during which time the Queen and her court will reside at Amsterdam. No less than three exhibitions are to be opened in the Dutch capital in honor of the occasion, and every kind of fête will be given. The Queen attains her majority on August 31, 1898, at 6 p. m., and from this moment she will take the reins of government into her own hands. According to the Dutch law the sovereign attains his or her majority upon the completion of the eighteenth year, and then begins to reign independently.

A VALUABLE BUFFALO HERD.

Lord Strathearn has presented his fine herd of buffalo to the Canadian government. The herd is said to be the only one in the northwest and it will be removed to the Banff National park.
