HE WAS TIRED OF LIVING

A MAUI CHINAMAN HANGS HIMSELF TO A TREE.

Was in the employ of Ah Mi at Makenu—Sheriff Baldwin held a Coroner's Inquest.

Sheriff Baldwin of Maui, who reached the city yesterday to attend to some business in court, brings news of a suicide near Makenu.

The suicide is a Chinaman named Ah Wa. Sheriff Baldwin went to Makenu himself to make the investigation. He found the unfortunate man hanging from a willow tree, about three-quarters of a mile back from the sea shore. He had been dead some little time before being discovered.

A coroner's inquest was held and very little evidence could be brought to light. It appears that Ah Wa was in very poor health and that he became tired of life. At least this was the conclusion reached by Sheriff Baldwin's jury.

Ah Wa was in the employ of Ah Mi, the wealthy Maui rice planter.

SETTLED OUT OF COURT.

The \$10,000 damage suit brought by Ah Mi, the Maui rice planter, against Sheriff Baldwin and Deputy King was settled out of court today. Ah Mi received 150.

DAMAGE CASES DROPPED.

The jury acting under the instructions of Judge Perry returned a verdict for the defendant today in the damage cases of Nakamura and five other Japanese against the Mahee Sugar Company.

SOMETHING ABOUT EGGS.

When in doubt about the freshness of eggs they should be tested in a brine made of ten ounces of water and one of salt. Put the eggs in this and the good ones will sink and the bad ones float. The best way to keep eggs fresh is to cover them with fresh lard, or with beeswax dissolved in warm olive oil; one part of wax to two of oil is the proper proportion.

Eggs with light colored shells usually have a light colored yolk, and often in delicate cookery there is a preference for them; in custards and yellow sponge cake on the contrary, the darker the yolk the better. Boiled eggs are better for not being boiled at all; dropped into boiling water and set off the stove for five minutes they are more evenly cooked than when boiled, a process that means the whole or part of it must be hard if the yolk is to be cooked at all, besides which the flavor is more delicate—more like a poached egg. An omelet should not be salted till just as it is to be folded over in the pan; salt put in when it is beaten toughens it and keeps it from rising as much as it otherwise would.

TEMPERATURE.

Some scientists now hold that above the altitude of 12,000 feet from the sea level the temperature decreases about one degree for every rise of 350 feet.
