MONEY FOR EDUCATION

(Continued from Page One.)

Rep. Kaai asked the following of the Minister of the Interior: "First—Do the water carts that sprinkle the streets belong to the Government?" "Second—If not to whom do they belong?"

Third—If to private parties, how much do the owners pay the Government for water used by the carts?" "Fourth—Can you state what the receipts of the owners of the carts are; and how much they collect from property owners along the roads watered?"

Under suspension of rules Attorney General Smith replied to Rep. Robertson respecting the number of sentences suspended in the past four years. The report showed 393 such cases for the two years ending December 31, 1895, on which sentence was subsequently imposed in 12 cases; for the two years ending December 31, 1897, 468 cases, out of which 22 had been subsequently sentenced.

Rep. Kahaloello read a petition from Molokai praying that House Bill No. 3, which closes that Island to the First Judicial Circuit, be not passed.

The bill giving the Road Boards authority to make penal regulations for the preservation of roads in their respective districts was referred to Special Committee on Roads.

WAITING ON DAVIS.

WASHINGTON, February 24.—Immediately on the return to the city of Senator Davis, chairman of the Senate Committee on Foreign Relations, a meeting of that body will be held to consider the form of a bill which is to take the place of the Hawaiian treaty, for it was admitted by a prominent Senator, a member of the committee named, that in the absence of a two-thirds vote to ratify the treaty no more time will be lost in pressing for consideration a bill of annexation. It is believed there will be sufficient votes to carry through a bill from the start, and a large majority being assured, it is thought the debate will not be prolonged. Senators favoring the bill now expect there will be a vote reached upon the resolution not later than April 1st, and perhaps sooner.
