



STEAMERS LIKELY TO ARRIVE IN 1905.

Some Facts and Figures That Prove Hawaii to be the Most Important Point in the Pacific.

Editor Star: It is of some interest to consider the rate of increase in the number of ocean steamers arriving at the port of Honolulu. I beg leave to present the following tabulated statement including seven years past. The first column gives the whole number of ocean steamers arriving during the first three months of the year given; the second column the number of American steamers; the third the number of British. Warships are not included.

Two points seem worthy of special attention:

First—That the steamer traffic is increasing steadily at a rate which doubles it in less than five years.

Second—This increase is mainly in British ships, which have trebled in the five year period, while the American ships have gained about one-fifth as much.

There seems no reason to question that the increase of traffic shown in the above tables is a natural one, in the regular order of things, and destined to continue steadily at no less a rate of growth. It is due entirely to the natural increase of commerce between the Pacific States, including British Columbia, and the empires across the ocean, China, Japan and Australasia.

China is only in the incipient stages of her foreign commerce. The productive power of her three hundred millions of apt and tireless workers have hardly yet begun to be applied to foreign exports. They must ultimately generate a trade across the Pacific, which will exceed that from Europe across the Atlantic. The present annual 200 steamer voyages across this ocean are not a tithe of what the next thirty years will witness. What must follow from their growth of commerce?

For one thing, it is clear that at the present rate of increase, there will be by 1905, in the ordinary growth of commerce, 33 steamers a month calling at the port of Honolulu. The present awakening of the United States to the necessities attendant on war may so hasten the construction of the Nicaragua canal that it will be opened by that time. That opening will at once send a crowd of Atlantic steamers across the Pacific to Asiatic ports, all of which must call here for coal. These will carry up our steamer arrivals to sixty a month. And this will increase from year to year.

These ships will be of many nationalities. There will probably be a good percentage of American. But doubtless the majority will continue, as now, under the British flag. It is clear that England will have a tremendous interest in this port.

When the time comes, as it will in a few years, that from thirty to forty large British steamers are calling every month at Honolulu for coal, England will be under an imperative necessity of seeing to it that Honolulu is a well governed port. If she sees it in competent American hands, that will meet her necessities. Should however the United States have declined the important responsibility of properly conducting this central point of Pacific commerce, then England will have no alternative but to take charge herself of Hawaii, in order that it do not become a pest-hole nor an impediment to commerce, as it will be in the failure of strong and capable government.

Within a very few years, Honolulu will become the permanent resort of an enormous crowd of ocean steamers, chiefly British, together with their great fleet of attendant collier ships. To handle such a crowd, to supply their urgent necessities, to maintain order, to provide wharfage, to protect them from pestilence and unsanitary conditions, to support a municipal life in the city, according to the enormous traffic, these duties will tax the best abilities of as strong and able a government as can be created here.

Such a government will have to be maintained here. There will be no alternative. The necessities of civilization and its vast commerce demand it even now, and will then demand it with multiplied force. If America does not provide that government, can any one fancy that England will fail to do it? Perhaps she will let Japan take the job, or Russia! But Hawaii is directly in the line of England's great trade route, and she is not apt to neglect her own interests.

Great Britain is not now reaching out for Hawaii, and has no expectation of doing so. She regards it as a certainty that the United States will soon accept the gift of the Islands. She is amazed and amused that there should be any hesitation in accepting it. But if so improbable an event should be, that America declines the gift, then England will have no alternative, for the protection of her commerce, but to undertake the task of maintaining competent government in Hawaii. She has simply got to do it.

But the unavoidable conclusion is that the United States will do it. Any hesitation can be only temporary. Our destiny is manifest. I do not here enter upon the question: How is such a steamer fleet to be provided for in this little pocket of a harbor? Fortunately, Pearl Harbor is close at hand to receive our overflow.
