

## IS INEVITABLE! DESTINY

PROMINENT PAPERS' VIEWS ON A LIVE QUESTION.

A Democratic View of What Should be Done—Chicago Tribune Speaks of the Reception to the Boys.

Here are some views on the annexation question. The Chicago Tribune says: As Senator Morrill is about the only member of the opposition to the Hawaiian annexation who will be listened to with respect, it is to be regretted that he could not have introduced some contemporary human interest into his consideration of the subject.

An occurrence reported from Honolulu only the day before Senator Morrill's speech was delivered even more urgently demanded attention at the hands of this venerable statesman, whose reputation is so high that he may row without reproach in this strange galley of sugar trust agents and general cussedness Democrats; may even stroke their boat. That occurrence was the enthusiastic reception of the first brigade of the army of the Philippines by the people of Honolulu, and the consequent protest of the resident Spanish consul. That brigade comprised little more than one-tenth of the army that will cross the Pacific this summer. If the Islands are not annexed the protest must, even upon the initiative of the United States, be respected. This country is the last one in the world that can afford to establish such a precedent as the disembarkment and refreshment of troops on the shores of a weak neutral power to the breach of that power's neutrality.

The Democratic Louisville Post says: It has not seemed to us necessary to resort to a joint resolution to secure Hawaii, but events legislate, and war is but a series of important events. Congress merely recording its decrees. The battle of Manila settled the Hawaiian question; it settled the question of building the Nicaragua canal. It made certain the annexation of Porto Rico and a Cuban protectorate.

Yet we hold Democratic caucuses to reverse the very decrees of destiny; we once more throw the Democratic party across the path of progress. But the vote in the House yesterday records the verdict of the American people; the past is past and a new chapter opens in American history.

We trust the so called leaders of the Democratic party will study the vote in the House yesterday and read the people's response to the action of a Bourbon caucus.

### AN ALTRURIA.

Strange Colony of Outlaws on the Bonin Islands.

A party of Japanese engineers, which has been exploring the Bonin Islands, found them inhabited by a strange, motley population of outcasts and outlaws from all nations. French, English, Italians, Spaniards and Scandinavians, being mixed up with natives of the Far East. In a delightful sub-tropical climate and on a soil that yields everything necessary for life, this strange community contrives to exist without laws or any form of government, and free from rates or taxes of any shape. The Japanese visitors state that some of the colonists who possessed some superiority in education and manners were recognized as chiefs, but held no defined authority.

### ELECTRIC RAILWAY CARS.

The West of France Railway Company contemplates a new departure in the utilization of its spare supply of electric current. Its intention is to provide electric cars for the use of passengers by its lines. The company has an electric plant which is not used during the greater part of the day, and would serve to charge the batteries. It now asks builders to design an electric car capable of carrying four passengers and 150 kilos of luggage, and able to run fifty kilometers daily. It will give six months' trial to the designs sent in, paying a daily rent for their use, and reserving the right of making a choice at the end of that period, and buying at a price agreed upon beforehand the vehicles which have taken part in the competition. The cars are to be furnished with an appliance by which the passengers will be able to go for a short distance and pay only according to the shortness of the trip. The old plan of charging a franc for a quarter of an hour brought endless disputes for want of a satisfactory "indicator." The fare now calls a car for a short trip, and the driver at once turns two keys, which brings the hands of a dial that mark both time and money to the starting point. The lowest fare allowed is, say, 12 cents; but if the passenger rides for over two minutes the charges goes up to 14 cents. When six minutes have passed the hand points to 20 centimes or 16 cents. For 22 cents one can drive for sixteen minutes, and for 28 cents twenty-three minutes. This is the circuit of the system, for at 50 cents the ordinary tariff for the course comes into operation.
