

WHAT SAILOR MEN TALK OF

THIRTEEN FOREIGN VESSELS DISCHARGING.

Several Out in the Stream Awaiting an Opportunity to Get to the Dock - Busy Times.

It is thought possible that the Almeida may get in tonight. At any rate she is expected early tomorrow morning. Four vessels entered at the custom house yesterday; the Transit with 990 tons of general merchandise, the Irwin with 800 tons, the Top Gallant with 1,750 tons of coal and the Orient with lumber.

The schooner Kaunilua is now known to be a complete wreck. It is doubtful if a single plank will be saved. She was formerly the Mary C. Bohm, and came from Yokohama, in 1886. She was sold by the German Consul.

The water front has seldom been busier than it is today. Thirteen ocean going vessels are discharging, besides the usual number of island vessels. The ships Joseph C. Potter, Henry Villard and E. B. Sutton and the bark Diamond Head are discharging coal. The barks Charles B. Kenney, Seminole and Top Gallant, coal laden, are waiting in the stream for a berth. The Aryan is loading sugar in the stream. The W. G. Irwin is discharging at the Oceanic wharf, and the Transit at the old fish market. The Orient is alongside the Nokomis, waiting for the latter to finish discharging.

THE SUMMER SCHOOL. Listens to Addresses on Agriculture by Local Experts.

Yesterday afternoon Commissioner of Agriculture Byron O. Clark addressed the Summer School on the interesting subject of the propagation of plants. In the evening Professor J. T. Crawley, the chemist of the Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Association, lectured on Hawaiian soils, a subject on which he is at home. By a comparison of the various soils and products therefrom of different districts of the Islands as well as by the difference in climatic conditions, he showed how much was to be gained by the practical agriculturist in a careful study of the soil and its capabilities for production.

Y. M. C. A. MEETING. The reports of the various officers and committees at the quarterly meeting of the Y. M. C. A. last night show the continued prosperity of this popular institution. Rev. Dr. Berger addressed the meeting on "Loyalty to the Association," and was warmly congratulated at the close. President W. C. Weedon presided at the meeting, which was largely attended. The musical program included a violin solo by W. A. Love and a vocal solo by J. Q. Wood.
