SMOKE AND LIGHTNING.

In certain parts of Australasia, says the New York Times, it is the custom of the natives to keep huge brush piles ready to ignite in case of a thunder storm. Columns of smoke, they believe, will ward off thunder bolts. Many travelers have regarded this as a mere superstition, as the burning of piles is accompanied with barbaric ceremonies. The travelers may be mistaken, for certain scientists look on smoke as a most excellent paratonnerre; they say it attracts and disperses the electric currents. If one stops to think, it will be recalled that we certainly hear of churches, flagpoles, stagings and other high structures being struck by lightning, we seldom hear of the heavy smoke producing foundries or mills or factories with tall chimneys being struck. Nevertheless, the tall chimneys have lightning rods which are not as useful perhaps as they seem. If the custom of the Australasians be founded in a practical knowledge of the power of smoke to disperse the electric fluid, they may have a higher civilized past than we moderns have any idea of.

AN ISLAND BOY IN MANILA

ALLEN M. WOLCOTT ENJOYS A SOLDIER'S LIFE.

Far More Tropical Than Honolulu, Beautiful Foliage, Lots of Fruit, and Rain Every Day.

Dr. Waldo Burgess received a letter a few days ago from Allen Wolcott, who enlisted here with the Colorado volunteers when en route to Manila. He writes in the very best spirits, saying that he enjoys soldiering very much. His health is excellent. He writes: "We can buy all the fruit we want, although it is not as cheap as it is in Hawaii nei. My! but these mangoes! I enjoyed those in Honolulu, but I am afraid that when I get back (for I hope to) they will not seem so good after these. I used to think that the foliage, etc., of Honolulu was incomparable, but now I know that there is at least one place where the growth is much more tropical and rank. One does not wonder at it though, when he considers the heat and great amount of moisture; 'the rain it raineth every day.' The heat has not bothered me as much as I thought it would. The other day when under the deck of the Raleigh it was about 94 degrees, it seemed almost cool.

"A friend and I had a great time getting out to the U. S. S. Raleigh. We started from the opposite side of the harbor for Cavite in a native canoe. These canoes are almost similar to those of Hawaii, but they are not so good. They have two outriggers, and are awfully slow. We started to paddle over about six miles to the transports (near Cavite), but after getting half way the water became so rough we had to turn. The brine would come over the side at an awful rate and while I paddled Willock baled. In this way we reached the Raleigh, which was lying about a mile off shore to protect us. We went on board and had a royal time. Both of us were wet to the skin.

"About 5 p. m., after being entertained, we started back behind a launch navigated by three sailors, while we were in a little boat and the canoe was tied behind it. The waves were so high that the launch nearly turned over, but off we started full tilt. In a trice the canoe filled and we cut her loose. Then our little boat started to take in bucketsful, and I slipped my old clothes, as we expected to have to swim. On we went laughing and shouting and wet through. At last after many narrow escapes we got to a little Spanish gunboat, the Calao, the one that came into the harbor after the battle and knew nothing about the war. It stood about a quarter of a mile out, and we wished to go ashore, but the captain was afraid to let us, so we had to stay there all night. The next morning, as it was calmer, we went ashore and to camp.

"I am enjoying life immensely, have good officers, the best regiment, a nice partner, etc. We are using shelter tents with a bamboo flooring raised a foot off the ground. The other night we were called out, but it was a mistake. The boys were chagrined that we did not get into a fight."

SAFETY AGAINST LIGHTNING.

On the approach of a thunder storm French peasants often make up a very smoky fire in the belief that safety from lightning is thus assured. By some this is deemed a superstition, but Schuster shows that the custom is based on reason, inasmuch as the smoke acts as a good conductor for carrying away the electricity slowly and safely. He points out that in over 1,000 cases of damage by lightning 6.3 churches and 8.5 mills have been struck, while the number of factory chimneys has only been 0.3.

THE LARGEST KITCHEN.

The largest kitchen in the world is in the great Parisian store, the Bon Marche, which has 4,000 employees. The smallest kettle contains 100 quarts, and the largest 200. Each of the fifty roasting pans is big enough for 500 chickens. Each dish for mashing potatoes holds 225 pounds. When omelets are on the bill of fare, 7800 eggs are used at once. For cooking alone sixty cooks and 100 assistants are always at the ranges.
