Captain William G. Goodman of the schooner Robert Lewers makes the following memorandum of his voyage: Had southwest and westerly winds first part of the passage, one southwest gale of short duration ending at north and clearing up. Have had fine weather generally the whole trip. The trades have been very moderate and we have had them from Lat. 35, Long. 139. On November 5th, 9:15 a. m., saw the steamer Australia, 780 miles north, 370 east, from Honolulu, and bound northeast.

A PRETTY INCIDENT. NEW YORK, October 30.—As the bright ensigns of two American warships fluttered a graceful return to the salute of the big incoming liner, Augusta Victoria, the band on the promenade deck of the liner struck up the introductory bars of the American National Anthem. Suddenly a soprano voice of wondrous quality flung to the winds the rhythmic lines of Francis Scott Key's noble anthem, and a contralto voice, rich and resonant, added its tribute of melody. Miss Emma Eames-Story and Mlle. Bauermeister thus joyously expressed their pleasure on returning to America. Among the other passengers of the Augusta Victoria were members of Maurice Grau's Metropolitan Opera Company, Eduard de Rezka, Pol Placoms, Suzanne Adams and Van Dyck, the new tenor.

TO OCCUPY CUBA. WASHINGTON, November 3.—The war department has issued a general order for the movement of troops to Cuba. The first troops will leave on or about November 22nd and will comprise a brigade under Brigadier General Carpenter. The brigade will be taken from the Seventh army corps and one of the regiments to go will be the Third Georgia. The brigade will be sent to Neuvas, Puerto Principe. THE HERO DEAD. Their Ashes are to Rest in American Soil. WASHINGTON, November 3.—The war department has made arrangements to bring all the bodies of soldiers who died in the Philippines, Cuba or Porto Rico home for burial, the expense to be paid out of the treasury. Orders will be sent to Hongkong immediately for caskets for the dead Manila soldiers to be forwarded to General Otis, and the dead soldiers will be shipped to San Francisco.
