EARTHQUAKE IN HILO.
A shock of earthquake on Wednesday morning, about half past 2 in the morning, awakened people who on account of guilty consciences and other reasons are light slumberers. The quiver, while of brief duration, was the most violent one for many months, and had it not been suppressed and cut off in its infancy would have no doubt done some damage to the first city of Hawaii.—Hilo Tribune.

HOW HE DIED.

Jury's Verdict of the Killing of Kazarakaku.
The jury appointed by Deputy Marshal Chillingworth to investigate the killing of Kazarakaku last Saturday, finished its deliberations yesterday by returning a verdict to the effect that he "came to his death by being crushed under a falling building, said Kazarakaku being employed as a carpenter in the erection of said building."

Several Japanese were examined. All told substantially the same story, and there was no indication that any one in particular was to blame for the accident, unless, indeed, it may have been the contractor, for not providing a better scheme for the removal of the building. Dr. Uchida testified as to the condition of the man when he arrived. He had died from a broken back.

The jury was composed of Iwakami, Asada, Murata, Yamada, Yoshihara and Ishii, all Japanese merchants of Honolulu.


