**CABLE BILL MAY PASS**

OPPOSITION TO THE MEASURE  
 ABANDONED.

Will Be Brought Up in the House  
 Again With Assurances of Success.  
 Changes Made.

WASHINGTON, February 4.—An-  
 other attempt to pass the Pacific cable  
 bill, which was killed by the determi-  
 ned opposition of Congressman Corlies  
 of Michigan, will be made soon, and  
 there have been assurances given to  
 the members of the House Commerce  
 Committee that the bill will pass.  
 They are now satisfied that there will  
 be only feeble opposition to the mea-  
 sure.

There will be such changes made in  
 the bill that it will not offer any of  
 the objections which were made in  
 the first place. There is to be a  
 clause which will give the Postmaster  
 General discretion in the awarding of  
 contracts, and this will bring into the  
 field other bidders for the franchise  
 than Scribner, with the result that  
 in the end the cable may be construct-  
 ed without a cent for bounty on the  
 part of the Government.

The Cabinet has already taken up  
 the matter and there has been a de-  
 cision that every power of the Admin-  
 istration should be put behind the  
 measure to force its passage at this  
 session. With the aid of the President  
 there seems little chance that the bill  
 will fail to pass when it is again called  
 up. The Hawaiian lobby now here is  
 at work for the bill, and will aid its  
 passage in every way.

**IMPORTANT MEETINGS.**  
 Consultations This Afternoon on the  
 Cemetery and Hospital.

This is the afternoon of the meeting  
 of officials on the cemetery for Halawa,  
 and the proposed hospital for consump-  
 tives. The first meeting will be  
 held in the office of President Dole at  
 the Executive building at 3 o'clock. The  
 other will follow at the same place an  
 hour later.

There is objection to the establish-  
 ment of the cemetery at Halawa, al-  
 though the board of health is practical-  
 ly unanimous on the matter. In con-  
 sultation with the executive and the  
 cemetery association it is understood  
 that the board will urge the adoption  
 of this site.

Trustees of the Queen's hospital and  
 physicians of the city will be present  
 at the consumptive hospital meeting.  
 Mr. Eckardt will also be asked to give  
 his views.

**GREENE ADMITS GREEN.**  
 General R. Jay Greene has begun a  
 campaign of beautifying the front ter-  
 race of the Executive building by  
 means of large potted palms and other  
 varieties of tropical plants. A half  
 dozen have been placed on the side  
 fronting the finance office and more  
 have been arranged along the border of  
 the old throne room. The effect is ex-  
 cellent, and proves quite interesting to  
 strangers.

**NEW CONSULATE.**  
 The Kobe chamber of commerce has  
 passed a resolution in favor of the es-  
 tablishment of a Japanese consulate  
 at Honolulu, and presented a memorial  
 to the foreign minister and both houses  
 of the diet on the subject.—Japan  
 Times.

**MAINE ANNIVERSARY.**  
 This is the first anniversary of the  
 blowing up of the Maine in Havana  
 harbor. Seventy-one days later war  
 began, and 107 days still later it was  
 over. A number of things have hap-  
 pened in the year directly traceable to  
 the destruction of the American bat-  
 tleship. The annexation of Hawaii is  
 probably one of them.

**NEW JAPANESE TAXES.**  
 At a conference held by Messrs. Hoshi  
 and Hayashi at the official residence  
 of the premier on the 1st inst, it was  
 decided, the Yordozu hears, that the  
 deficit in the revenue should be made  
 up by an increase in the tax on soy,  
 amounting to yen 1,400,000, extra toba-  
 cco tax amounting to yen 700,000, and an  
 increase of the postal rates to the  
 amount of yen 2,000,000, while the  
 balance of the deficiency should be  
 drawn from the indemnity. The pro-  
 posed house tax in this event will be  
 withdrawn.—Japan Times.
