NEW LAWS FOR HAWAII.

Report on Extending the Contract Labor Laws to the Islands. WASHINGTON, February 10.-Senator Kyle of the Senate Committee on Education and Labor has decided to report favorably at once the House bill providing for the extension of the contract labor laws of this country to Hawaii. This measure was rushed through the lower body and will be brought before the Senate immediately. At the same time Senator Fairbanks, chairman of the Immigration Committee, has ready for report Perkins' bill extending the Chinese exclusion and contract labor laws, and both bills will reach the Senate tomorrow or Monday.


