HAPPY SPANISH SOLDIER

HOW THE SPANISH COLONEL GETS RICH QUICKLY.

An Ingenious Method of Simplifying Accounts—The Immense Value of Incidentals in Paying Off.

Spanish army accounts are strangely and wonderfully made, says a writer on Spain. From their absence of exactness and disregard of all detail one would certainly be led to believe that the book keeping department of the Madrid war office has very few clerks in its employ. A certain amount of money is allowed to each regiment and charged in gross to the colonel, who is solely responsible for its disbursement.

According to an explanation made recently by the Marquis of Montoro, secretary of the treasury in Havana, this lump sum of money covers the entire expenses of the regiment, from uniforms and equipment to soldiers' pay. Each regimental colonel is his own bookkeeper and paymaster. He practically sells to his soldiers at his own price everything that they have while they are in the service of Spain. The pay of a common soldier is about \$3 in gold per month. Against this is charged whatever he wishes to buy. For example, a soldier needs a new pair of shoes, he makes his wants known to his colonel, who hands him a pair and takes \$3 or \$4 out of his wages. The shoes may not have cost the colonel more than \$1.50, which he paid for out of the regimental funds. Out of one of his own men, who has left home and family for his country, he has made 100 per cent by turning over government capital.

When the time for final settlement comes the soldier is quietly told that there is nothing to his credit on the books of the regiment; that his great and good government has taken care of him for three years, and has allowed him the privilege of fighting for it, and that if he doesn't have a proper sense of gratitude he is a base traitor, who isn't worthy to be called a Spaniard, an argument which has heretofore worked very well. But this is not all the trouble. Each regiment is charged with a considerable sum of money for hospital services, and the colonel deducts a proportionate percentage from each soldier's pay for that purpose. Another percentage is deducted for what in Spanish bookkeeping is called "incidentals."

Roquefort cheese, the delight of all modern epicures, is made of a mixture of goat and sheep milk, says the Philadelphia Evening Telegraph. The reputation of this cheese extends back into dim antiquity, and Pliny mentioned it in his writings.

It is made chiefly from the milk of goats and sheep, and the records of France it is stated that, in the year 1886, 250,000 sheep and goats, out of a flock of 400,000, gave enough milk for the making of 7,150,000 pounds of cheese.

In the manufacture of Roquefort cheese the curd is made and pressed in the evening, after their return from the pastures, and after they have been allowed to rest for an hour or so. The evening's milk is heated almost to the boiling point, and then is set aside. In the morning it is skimmed, heated to 98 degrees, and mixed with the morning's milk for coagulation. The curd is well kneaded with the hands and pressed in layers into moulds with perforated bottoms. A thin layer of mouldy bread is put between each layer of curd.

The object of this is to hasten the "ripening" of the cheese, by supplying the germs of the green mold peculiar to cheese. The bread used for this purpose is made before the preceding Christmas of about equal parts of summer and winter barley, with plenty of yeast dough and some vinegar.

When mouldy enough it is ground and sifted, moistened with water, and then kept from the air until used in making the cheese.

The curd remains in the mold for three or four days. Then they are taken to the market in Roquefort where they are sold to the different makers of Roquefort cheese.

These manufacturers continue the ripening of the cheeses by placing them in the very damp caves which abound in the precipitous walls of the limestone hills which almost completely surround the village.

The cheeses are left in the caves for sometimes more than a month, during which time salt and brine are rubbed into them, and they are pricked frequently with long needles to let the salt penetrate into them and also to accelerate the process of moldering.
