DEMURRERS ARE UPHELD

DECISION IN A BIG MAUI CASE.

Concerns Land of a Native Hui Which Was Leased by J. K. Smythe and Others—Judge Kalua's Opinion.

Judge J. W. Kalua, of Maui, has filed a decision and decree in the case of John Kalua, et al., vs. James K. Smythe, et al., bill for cancellation of lease, sustaining the demurrer of defendants on two important grounds. The first point, which is allowed, is nonjoinder of parties, the court holding that all the members of the hui should appear as either plaintiffs or defendants.

The court is further of the opinion that the bill is defective in not containing an allegation that the lease was made without authorization by the board of directors of the hui, thereby not stating facts sufficient to constitute a cause of suit. The court says: "It would appear that the trustee, Smythe, was a creature of the board of directors."

In conclusion the court makes and signs the following decree: "It is therefore ordered, adjudged and decreed that the demurrers of defendants to plaintiffs' bill of complaint herein be and the same are hereby sustained upon the two points above defined, and that in all other respects the said demurrers are overruled."

"It is further ordered and decreed that plaintiffs have twenty days within which to amend their bill as they may be advised."

This is the Hawaiian hui suit, on Maui, which has gained much notoriety. Smythe and others attempted and did lease the lands of the hui without reference to a number of their partners and Kapekape, Castle, Weaver and Kinney, Ballou & McClanahan appeared for plaintiffs, and Henshall, Robertson & Wilder, Dickey, Kaneakua, Hartwell and Judd for defendants.

LICENSE GRANTED.

Supreme Court Says Tai Kee May Run Lodging House.

The Supreme Court yesterday afternoon affirmed the decision of the Circuit Judge in the case of Tai Kee, petition to compel the Minister of Interior to issue a lodging house to complainant. By the decision Minister Young will be forced to issue the license.

This is an old matter, having hung fire in the courts for a very long time. Petitioner had a lodging house in Makiki near the baseball grounds, but ran it in such a manner that numerous complaints were made by respectable residents of the neighborhood. Upon these complaints the Minister of Interior refused to reissue the license, and the suit followed.

It is understood that the decision will not settle the matter. Residents of the district are very determined. They will next proceed through the Board of Health toward a condemnation of the premises, and if failure is there met with will lay the matter before the legislature at its coming session.

COMMISSIONER TOWSE.

Mr. Towse was president of the commission to the Greater America Exposition at Omaha. Mr. Towse will resume his duties as city editor of the Advertiser.
