## AUSTRALIA PASSENGERS

THE VESSEL TO SAIL ON WEDNESDAY.

Rules for Fumigation of Baggage and Going on the Steamer—Tickets Now Being Sold.

The sailing of the Australia has been postponed till 4 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. Irwin & Company have begun the sale of tickets and assignment of cabins to those who receive permits to go from Dr. Carmichael. The list of passengers has been growing apace, and is now a remarkably long one.


