## ACT TO MITIGATE PLANS

PROJECT FOR LAZARETTO IN PALAMA.

Will Be Entirely Away From Any Public Thoroughfare, and Entirely Under Police and Sanitary Regulations.

A solution has apparently been found for the difficulties which arose under the "Act to Mitigate," following the Chinatown fire and the destruction of Paualhi street.

A Japanese hui has leased a tract of land on the mauka side of King street, just beyond Aala Lane and the Palama grocery. It is proposed to build a row of stores on the front of this tract facing King street. Each of these stores will be an entrance twelve or sixteen feet wide, leading back into a square area surrounded by a tight board fence, twelve feet high. On each side of this square, inside the fence will be built a long, one-story building, divided into single rooms. The four buildings will all face the center of the square, and will contain in all, about 240 rooms. The only entrance or exit to this enclosed area will be through the passage way leading to King street. This passage way will be lighted by Washington lights. A policeman appointed and commissioned by the police department, but paid by the owners of the property, will be constantly on duty in this passage way.

The property all around the area reserved will be occupied by cottages and tenements occupied by Japanese and others who do not object to proximity to this quarter. In the way of the street itself will be at some distance from any public thoroughfare and separated from every thoroughfare, not only by the high fence, but by buildings.

No one is to be allowed to live in the segregated and fenced in quarter. The women for whom the quarter is prepared, will only be permitted to be there during certain hours. Their male companions will not be admitted at all.

In addition, the projectors of this arrangement will provide an office and physicians' room, where the examinations required by the act to mitigate may be conducted, instead of requiring the women to be taken through the streets to the Board of Health as is now done. The entire place will be fitted up with the most modern sanitary appliances.

The plan has been submitted to the police authorities and has been approved by them. It is now identical with a plan proposed some time ago by Theodore Richards, except that the location is different. From a police point of view the proposed location is better than that prepared by Mr. Richards, as it is nearer the police station, and at the same time is less public than the other.

### AT THE ORPHEUM.

Though not exactly a case of "fools who came to laugh remained to pray," yet without a doubt a good many who went to the Orpheum last night expect to laugh at Hogan's whimsicalities, came nearer crying. Hogan's "Uncle Tom" is a revelation, the man is a most versatile and powerful actor, who, while realizing to the full what dramatic license allows, never steps over the line for an instant.

The large house several times literally thundered with applause. As a general rule with Orpheum audiences the comedy of the play evokes the greatest enthusiasm; last night, however, the intense, pathetic scenes of "Uncle Tom" brought the plaudits. The play was well staged, a good deal of new scenery being used. The singing was excellent, and there was plenty of it; yet, not too much.
