**MEMORANDA.**

**SAN FRANCISCO, June 25.**—The trial trip of the Californian, the pioneer steamer of the American-Hawaiian Steamship Company, will take place on Thursday. The finishing touches are now being put on the vessel at the Union Iron Works, and it is confidently expected that the vessel will more than fulfill her requirements. She will leave the Union Iron Works early in the morning and be given a spurt on the bay to warm up her engines and then go outside the heads.

The trial of the Californian is of interest to the Coast for more reasons than one. In the first place she will establish a new route for steamers between here and New York by way of Honolulu. From here the steamers of the new line will carry general merchandise to Honolulu, then take sugar to the Atlantic seaboard and return to San Francisco with general cargoes. The Californian is the largest commercial craft ever built on the Coast, but the keel of a larger vessel for the same company has been laid at the Union Iron Works.

The Californian, as soon as she has been accepted by her owners will commence taking in cargo for Honolulu.

**SAN FRANCISCO, June 27.**—The British ship Hilston, on which reinsurance has been offered for several days, has been posted as bound from Honolulu for Puget Sound. The rate of reinsurance is only ten per cent, which is a consolation for the reason that the vessel is out sixty days. The mystery of the small rate was solved today, when M. A. Newell, the reinsurance broker, received a cable from London saying that the Hilston is bound from Honolulu for the west coast of South America. The vessel may be delayed a long time near her destination by calms, and apparently the English underwriters are not greatly alarmed about her.

**SAN FRANCISCO, June 22.**—Reinsurance on the overdue schooner Americana, loaded with niter, and bound from Iquique for this port, jumped today to forty per cent. If the vessel is not heard from within the next few days the reinsurance will advance to fifty per cent and perhaps more. Local speculators have been doing considerable business in the overdue craft, and much interest is taken in the welfare of the vessel for various other reasons. The Americana is out 119 days and has not been spoken since she sailed.

While the overdue craft was at Iquique she was bought by C. A. Hooper and others of this city. Among the others is Captain Murchison, who is to have command of the vessel when she arrives. The purchase price of the Americana was \$4,000. Notwithstanding the vessel's long passage, there are many who think that reinsurance on her is a good investment. She has a record as a slow craft, and it is said that she was very foul when she sailed. Captain Murchison has insured this interest in the craft at 20 per cent.

**WASHINGTON, June 26.**—The war department today issued an order to the big department tug Slocum, now in New York harbor, to proceed immediately to San Francisco and report there for duty in the war department. This is one of the biggest tugs in existence, and possibly the first to go over the course made famous by the trip of the Oregon. The tug is being sent to San Francisco because the Spreckels people, who own the only tug fit for the service of the government now there, rent their tug to the government at a big price and weave conditions around the rental that are repugnant to the department.

**EJECTMENT SUITS.**

The Kapiolani estate has entered a number of suits to recover various parcels of land in Honolulu, claimed to be the property of the late Queen Dowager. All the suits are in ejectment. They are against Peck & Co., Territory of Hawaii; L. A. Thurston et al.; and W. R. Castle et al. The matters will come before the August term of the Circuit court.

**ROBERTS CONVICTED.**

**SALT LAKE, June 24.**—In the case of B. H. Roberts, found guilty of unlawful cohabitation, the judgment of the court was that he pay a fine in the sum of \$150, or in lieu thereof that he be imprisoned in the county jail for a period of 150 days. A thirty days' stay was granted in order that the defendant might file a bill of exceptions.


