## PIGGOTT UNDER BONDS

WOLTERS' HEAD PROTECTED FOR ONE YEAR.

Judge Wilcox Decided Piggott Intended to Inflict Bodily Harm on Wolters—Piggott Separated Wolters' Family.

J. Piggott the special policeman was placed under \$500 bonds by District Judge Wilcox this morning, to keep the peace for one year against the person and property of E. H. F. Wolters. This ruling was the result of the trial of Piggott on a charge of intent to do bodily harm preferred by Wolters. It was shown by witnesses that last Monday Piggott drove to the home of Wolters and asked for the latter. Piggott appeared to be very excited and paced up and down the hall. Wolters did not respond to the request for his presence so Piggott went away and called upon Charles Creighton the attorney to whom he said that Wolters had better keep out of his way for he wanted to smash his head. It was further stated by witnesses that Piggott had threatened to "fix that Dutch" Wolters took the stand and said that for the past year he had been in mortal fear of bodily harm at the hands of Piggott. On one occasion Piggott had met him and Wolters felt certain that only for the presence of some iron maulers, Piggott would then and there have made way with him. The witness declared that he and his wife had separated on account of Piggott but he did not bear the latter any malice. "Tell what you meant by saying that Piggott caused you and your wife to separate" was requested on cross-examination. "The court is well enough acquainted with that already," replied Wolters, and no further effort was made to throw light upon what was no doubt the real cause of animosity between the men. The defendant offered no testimony. The court said that he though an excellent case had been made out against the defendant and he would put him under bonds sufficiently heavy to restrain him from injuring Wolters.

## ROYAL RELICS

Advertised Sale of Left Over Articles Was Postponed Today.

The auction sale of royal relics advertised to take place this morning at Morgan's auction rooms, was indefinitely postponed. The court said no buyers on hand is the reason. The articles to be sold, were some articles of furniture and similar things left over from the big auction sale in the Drill Shed last April. The silver and table ware withdrawn from the sale at that time was not included in the proposed sale today. The government has not decided yet that it will sell it. The aggregate receipts from the sale of royal relics last April was something over \$4,000.
