WARRANTS ARE NECESSARY

WITHOUT THEM POLICE RAIDS ARE ILLEGAL.

Search Warrant Must be Sworn Out before Search for or Seizure of Private Property is Made.

Judge Humphreys' ruling yesterday that even the heathen Chinese's home in his castle and must not be searched without a properly prepared and signed search warrant has created consternation among the police, especially among those officers whose duty it is to make "opium" and gambling raids in Chinatown. The decision was given in the case of Ah Chong, charged with having opium in possession. Deputy High Sheriff Chillingworth told the story of the raid on Ah Chong's premises in Liliha street and produced pipes, opium and other smoking material as evidence. In answer to a question he stated that he had not a search warrant when the raid was made.

Turning to the jury Judge Humphreys stated that the stenographer would be instructed to strike all the testimony of Chillingworth from the records and that the "twelve good and true" should not consider it in making up their verdict. The reason for this action, explained the court, was that the police officers had exceeded their authority in entering the premises of Ah Chong without a warrant. In fact they were trespassers in the house of the Chinaman and their testimony was impertinent in the case.

"We have a law which provides how search warrants may be issued to police officers," said Judge Humphreys, "and they are the last officers or the last persons who should go around breaking into peoples' houses without search warrants. Nobody's rights of liberty are safe if that may be done." The authority upon which the Judge based his ruling is found in the syllabus as follows: Search and seizure of a man's private papers to be used in evidence for the purpose of convicting him of a crime recovering a penalty, or of forfeiting his property, is totally different from the search and seizure of stolen goods, dutiable articles on which the duties have not been paid, and the like, which rightfully belong to the custody of the law.

The seizure or compulsory production of a man's private papers to be used in evidence against himself is equivalent to compelling him to be a witness against himself, and in the prosecution of a crime, penalty or forfeiture, is equally within the prohibition of the 5th amendment.

Officer Hanrahan was the next witness. When he was called the court inquired if he was with Chillingworth in the raid and would testify to the same line of facts. Yes, was the answer. Judge Humphreys thereupon declined to let the witness testify at all.

The decision of Judge Humphreys in this matter, the police say, will make it very hard for the police to handle cases of gambling and opium smoking. In the past it has been the habit to go the rounds of the "joints," catching whatever came in the police drag net. Sometimes it might be opium and at others gamblers. In a night dozens are arrested. Scores of suspect places would be visited. The police have ostensibly assumed the responsibility of entering premises without search warrants, but as a matter of fact no Chinaman has ever made a kick about it.

DISTRICT COMMITTEES. The district committees of this island will meet in Honolulu tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock. Delegates of the Fourth district will assemble in the drill shed and those of the Fifth district in the Chamber of Commerce. The delegates will select the delegates to the Territorial convention and will transact such business as may necessarily come before them as district committees.

ONE MORE CHANCE. There is still a bare possibility that Hilo may capture the Republican convention. It comes about as a result of the statements of Colonel Little in The Star of Monday to the effect that the second city had raised the money required and was expecting to get the convention. Several members of the central committee think that if Hilo has actually gone that far, she should at least be given a chance to be heard before the matter is decided. Accordingly a letter was yesterday sent by the Mauna Loa, to be telephoned to Hilo, asking that the guarantee be made definite by the return Kinau or the committee would consider the proposition dropped.

FOR LORBEER'S GRAVE. A laurel wreath has been received here for the grave of the late John Lorbeer, who was shot on August 12 by Samuel Barney in the yard of the Oahu Railway Company. Accompanying it was a note reading as follows: "Will you kindly place this wreath, our love token, on our boy's grave? We send the laurel wreath in remembrance of its deep significance to us—the name of Lorbeer being the German form of the word laurel—and we also think it will keep green and fresh for sometime. "To the many friends in Honolulu who have shown their love and respect by their kind words and loving remembrances to us and our dear son and brother who was so cruelly assassinated, we wish to extend a gratitude which words cannot express.
