DEMOCRATS GET IN LINE

REPUBLICAN PARTY RIPPED UP THE BACK.

Orators of the Untrifled Speak to a Big House at the Orpheum—J. O. Carter and Others.

The Democratic mass meeting at the Orpheum last night, was a very successful campaign gathering. The theater was filled. A band in the back of the hall supplied music. Colonel Charles J. McCarthy was chairman and called the meeting to order. With him on the stage were J. O. Carter, H. J. Mossman, Frank Harvey, Abraham Fernandez, C. W. Booth, John D. Holt, Jr., F. J. Testa, C. H. Bishop, C. J. Hutchins, E. B. McClanahan, S. W. Spencer, E. C. Macfarlane and J. M. Camara. S. K. Kaloa was the first speaker. He talked about fifteen minutes in native and was frequently applauded.

Abraham Fernandez was the next speaker. He spoke in native and was frequently applauded.

J. O. Carter said: "I come before you this evening to speak a word of soberness; I believe of truth. The conditions in the days of Kalakaua and now are different. Today our flag has passed. I am free to say, I am sorry for what has passed but as a good citizen will make the best of conditions. There are some among Hawaiians who have advised Hawaiians to stand apart. I can not advise this. Whites and Hawaiians live here together and we are in duty bound to make the best of it. There are some who have said because I accepted the nomination of the Democrats I had gone back on the natives. I beg you not to believe that. I was with you as a boy, a young man and since, and my feeling for you is as loyal as ever. I say to you that we are bound to do that that is best for natives and haoles. I am a Democrat because of my reading, because of my reasoning, because the administration of Grover Cleveland has made me one. It is for you Hawaiians to decide where you will go. As for me, I go with the Democrats. If you go with me I shall be very glad. The Democrats have shown that they have no feeling against you by placing at the head of their ticket Prince David. I am glad to run on that ticket. Let everyone circulate and support that ticket.

"While I stand with the Democrats, I wish to say that I am not one whit less loyal to the independence of Hawaii. Mr. Carter was frequently and loudly applauded.

S. W. Spencer spoke in Hawaiian. He is a candidate for the House of Representatives.

Major J. M. Camara said he was entirely in favor of the platform of the Democratic party.

Frank Harvey, candidate for Representative from the Fifth district was the next speaker. His address was also in Hawaiian.

E. C. Macfarlane did not see that we should bother about national affairs; we had ample local affairs, of such import as to tax the utmost abilities of our best men. The Hawaiian will become an important factor in politics, and it will require no prophetic eye to see them ranged in the Democratic party, for it is not to be supposed that they will align themselves with the party that has robbed them of their independence. The die is now cast, however, and I do not wish to reopen the wounds of those unhappy days. In future the Hawaiian must be recognized, and it is not to be supposed that they will ally themselves with their natural political enemy. I opposed annexation because I thought it would be detrimental to the Hawaiians and the commercial interests as well. Annexation was perhaps the worst thing that could have happened. The policy of imperialism of the Republican party can but result in disaster to Hawaii. This policy means the annexation of Cuba and Philippines, and that means the death blow to this country. The sugar policy of the Republican party threatens to extinguish the industries of these islands.

From this point the speaker spoke of the platform in very complimentary terms and as religiously abused the Republican platform.

C. J. Hutchins was the next speaker. He took up national questions, speaking of imperialism, of 16 to 1 and of other matters.

E. B. McClanahan closed the evening with an earnest appeal for support to the Democratic ticket and platform. He dealt with national questions, dwelling particularly upon that of imperialism.

After the meeting badges were distributed to those desiring them.
